Principals Report



Term 1

2008 got off to a great start. We celebrated our students' very good performances in 2007 NCEA, our student roll had grown significantly with many students returning to Te Puke High School from other secondary schools, students were wearing their improved uniform with pride and it was very pleasing to see our students and staff actively engaged in quality academic learning.

Within the first few weeks our students and staff were involved in the first of many fun yet competitive activities thanks to the newly introduced houses of Blake, Hillary, Sheppard and Ngata. House competitions throughout the year included: athletics day, basketball shooting competition and 5-aside teachers' soccer competition, swimming sports, Lip Synch competition, Spelling Bee competition, Theatre Sports and the Battle of the Houses competition. The competitive house spirit and rivalry is certainly alive and well at Te Puke High School!

During Term 1 our students achieved fantastic sporting successes including: Samantha Dunick placed 1st in Senior Girls 100m and Triple Jump at Waikato BOP Athletics Championships, Natalie Peat winning three Under 14 national titles at the Ocean Athletes Championships, the Senior Girls Water Polo team finishing runners-up in the Bay of Plenty Secondary Schools Championship, Natalie Peat selected for the NZ Under 15 girls Water Polo squad, Katalla Kramer placed 3rd in down river and slalom events at National Secondary Schools Championships and was selected for NZ white water slalom kayaking Under 18 development squad.

The Art department hosted a very successful Exhibition and Auction of student and staff works which enabled the purchase of extra photographic equipment. To close the first term the legendary Te Puke High School Lip Synch competition was held over two nights. Playing to packed community audiences many of our students took up the chance to emulate favourite pop singers or staff! The winning group consisting of Hannah Cliff, Jo Farquhar and Christine Kokiri was a very popular choice.

Term 2

In June and July staff visited local Marae to talk with students, parents/caregivers and the community on Māori student achievement at Te Puke High School. This road show focussed on the essential positive influence that families and communities have on raising student achievement.

"GREASE" was the word for our 2008 production and what a show it was. The success of the production was due to an energetic commitment of students, staff and the community in the 80 strong cast, the crew and the musicians. The performance of our students was nothing short of outstanding with foot stomping tunes and superb dancing. Audiences packed into the school hall to see this classic show with every night sold out.

Sporting achievements during Term 2 included: Briar Miller winning five championship titles at the Bay of Plenty Secondary Schools Swimming Championships (1st Girls Open 200m freestyle, 1st U18 Girls 50m butterfly, 1st U18 Girls 100m Individual Medley, 1st U18 Girls 50m freestyle and 1st U18 Girls 100m freestyle), Gillian Dean was placed 1st Secondary School girl in the Kaimai Classic multisport event and Donelle Herdman is selected for the BOP girls' squash team for the NZ Juniors tournament.

Term 3

In August students and staff celebrated a memorable moment at Te Puke High School. A special assembly marked the launch of the Te Puke High School Bar, Blue and Gold awards to recognise, honour and celebrate our students' excellent achievement in the following endeavours: Academic, Sports, Arts, Leadership, Service and Citizenship. This month will also be remembered as the time students and staff paid tribute to Mr. Wayne Abrahams, who passed away after having taught at Te Puke High School for almost 30 years. Mr A was a great man and an outstanding teacher who made a positive difference to the lives of so many.

In September Te Puke High School hit the headlines of the Bay of Plenty Times. Our computer support team, Clint and Mauricio, developed their own interactive white board, the Clincio, which performs as well as the commercially produced brands for a fraction of the price! This innovative development, along with the major upgrade of computers throughout our school have enabled our school to leap to the next stage of our technological development.

Staff Positions

Dance students represented the school at a Hip Hop Dance competition in Auckland. They returned far more knowledgeable for the experience and rearing to go for the next competition. Once again Te Puke High School was well represented in the inter-secondary school Starquest competition at Baycourt Theatre.

Sporting achievements continued during Term 3 with Hannah Wells being selected for the Under 19 Bay of Plenty netball team, Teryll Lepper selected for the Tauranga Under 18 girls hockey team, Jamie Culligan selected for the boys Under 18 Bay of Plenty rugby team. Chelsea Stewart finished as top individual Stableford score in the Bay Secondary Schools Eagles Society tournament, to add to her Net stroke play title at the Manihera Memorial Golf tournament, Gillian Dean places 2nd Senior Girl in the BOP Secondary Schools Multisport Championships, and the Te Puke High School's girls squash team of Alix Howes, Donelle Herdman, Samantha Brown, Josie Schultz, Shannon Bennett and Kerryn Wooderson win the BOP Squash Team Championships, for the second year in a row and 4th in the NZ Secondary Schools Teams event. The boys team finished runners up in the BOPSS Squash Championships.

Term 4

Term Four started well with two other memorable moments for Te Puke High School. Firstly, the school's application to host international students was accepted by the Ministry of Education. This means that starting in 2009 we look forward to hosting international fee paying and exchange students. Secondly, the Board of Trustees and Senior Leadership Team designed an ambitious strategic plan to develop the school campus over the next 10 years in to a modern learning environment that caters for the educational needs of our 21st Century learners. Sporting during Term 4 included: Boys pair Cameron Huxley and Tim Verwey qualify to represent Region 2 (Counties, Waikato and Bay of Plenty) in the NZ Secondary Schools Lawn Bowls Championships, along with the Girls pairing of Kayla Anderson and Shandelle Tennet. The Arts were well represented when our Junior Band took to the road towards the end of Term 4 visiting and entertaining three local primary schools. The Fuelled 4 Schools healthy eating, healthy action initiative involved performing "Mr Slobby and the Girl from Bebo" to over 2,300 local primary school students.

It is exciting times for students and staff of Te Puke High School. 2009 promises to provide more fantastic opportunities for our students as we continue our development as a Professional Learning Community.

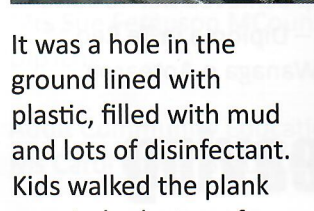
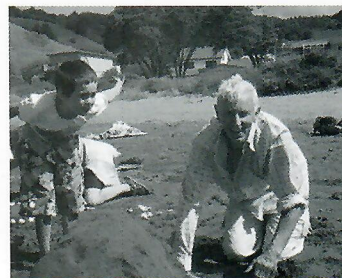


Wayne Abrahams

Wayne and Judy along with their children Brent, Mark and Kim arrived in Te Puke in 1979. The following year their youngest son Paul was born. Wayne has taught full time at Te Puke High since then. Twenty five years ago Wayne and Judy both gave their lives to Jesus. This led them to becoming involved in youth group and running a Christian Fellowship at school. Together they led many youth camps and study camps before senior exams. Together they also produced several major Christian shows like Hi Tops where up to 80 kids were involved. They also ran beach missions over the New Year period for many years at Tirohanga Motor Camp. As a result of getting involved in the lives of young people many came to live with them for 3 to twelve months, in fact 50 different people have lived with the Abrahams family. For twenty years they have run the Tarawera Christian camp for year 10 students and have enjoyed the support of all the churches in town in making this camp the highlight of many students time at school. Students have a great time skiing, tubing down the river etc and hearing the gospel. Many have had life changing encounters with God while on this camp.

Wayne was a dedicated teacher, always enthusiastic about learning. He had a gift for inspiring even the most reluctant learners and his work was acknowledged when he received the inaugural Jim Campbell Award for excellence in teaching. He coached school rugby teams.

Wayne was also a great family man. He was fully involved in his kid's lives cherishing every moment with them. He coached whatever sport his boys played and they chose quite a variety. He even bought a boat for Kim to ski behind despite the fact he hated water and struggled to remember all the things you need to do to launch a boat successfully. He made sure that there were regular fun times. While living at Pongakawa many kids visited so they could enjoy his magic carpet rides on a tarpaulin behind the tractor. Te Puke High graciously granted Wayne and Judy leave from 1995 to 1997 so that they along with Paul could spend two years in Nepal working for the International Nepal Fellowship, a mission who provided medical help and rural development to one of the poorest countries. They ran a hostel for 11 kids of missionaries and other expats whose parents worked in remote areas of Nepal. They also taught in the international school, KISC that these students attended. Many other people stayed with them at the hostel at various times. Wayne's adventurous, zany character was given full reign while there. One highlight was a hostel party just before they left. The whole school (80 students) were invited and Wayne and the new hostel dad, Alex van Meygaarden created a "pit of doom" in the back yard.



It was a hole in the ground lined with plastic, filled with mud and lots of disinfectant. Kids walked the plank over it, had a tug of war over it (losers

landing in it) and did a water slide into it. They went home absolutely filthy but could not believe the fun they had and talked about it for weeks. A quote from one of the hostel kids "Mr A was the absolute highlight of my time at KISC".

Wayne was an elder and then a manager at St Andrews Presbyterian Church. He also ran the Sunday school for many years. Kids just loved going to Sunday school with Mr A and most Sundays he gave them an ice cream if they could give him the password which was JESUS RULZ. He really was still a kid at heart. Nothing was ever too much trouble for Wayne. If ever there was someone needing a hand, Wayne was there to help.

Wayne loved people and none more than his grandchildren. To ensure that his grandkids would always want to visit him he transformed the attic in his home into a cave filled with Plasma Balls, lava lamp, fibre optic balls, a laser and many more fascinating items. Kids of all ages have marvelled at his work. Because of his keen sense of adventure he chain sawed a hole in the back of his wardrobe and created a tunnel from one end of the house to the other end where the cave was. But the creativity didn't stop there it spilled out in to the kid's room where he created four themed bed bays. The kids could choose to sleep in a space bed, a princess bed, a knights bed or a butterfly bed.

His passing has left a huge gap in the lives of many people but we know that he is right now partying with Jesus in heaven and we will see him again.

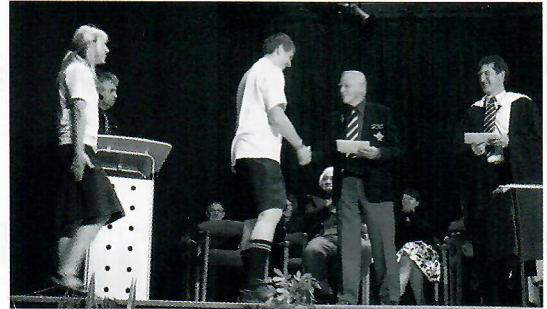

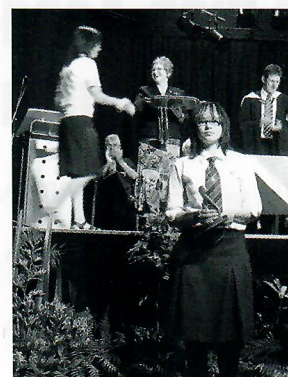

A big thanks to Mrs. Voss and the rest of the Zespri team for all the support though it. We all had a great time and thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity.

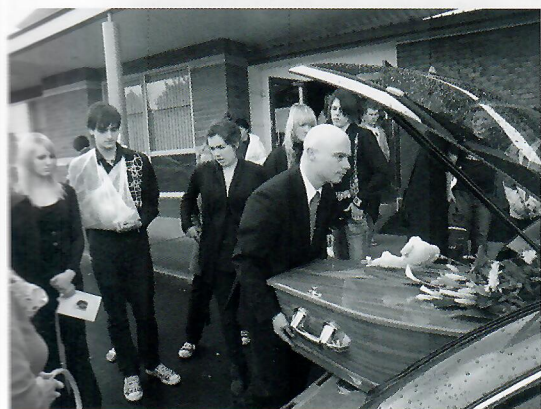

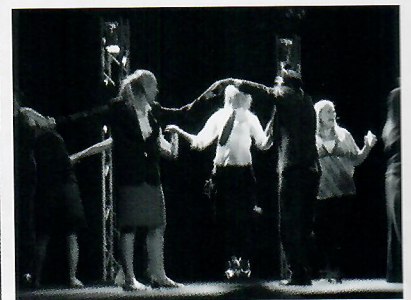
Young Leaders Day

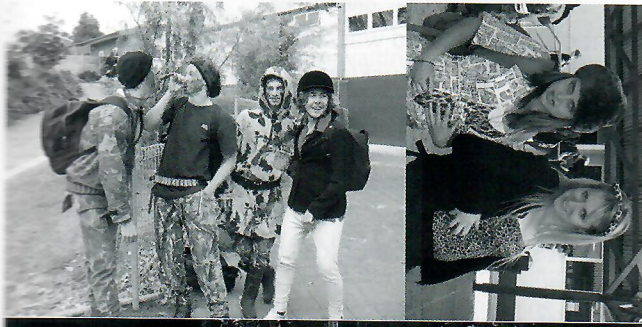

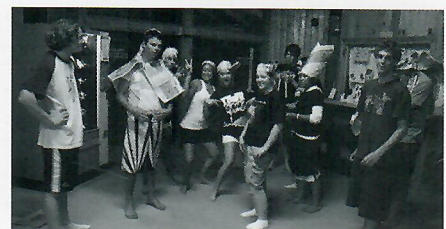
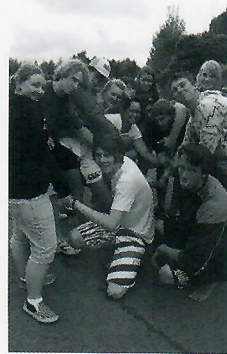


Mufti Days

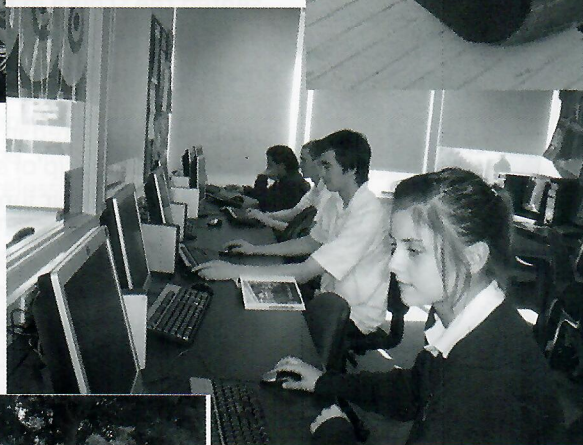
Work experience was taken up by approximately half the year 11 students and gave students insight into a possible career path for them. Thank you to the community for supporting our students in the Work Experience Programme.

Year 12 students have learnt time management skills, produced a plan for their future and explored career options in this class.

Life skills students investigate career paths, learn time management skills, goal setting, learn about costs of tertiary education, loans and allowances, interview skills, scholarships and course applications.

Future Plus students are a combined year 12 and 13 class completing the National Certificate in Employment skills. As part of this course they explore various careers in the community. This included visits to AFFCO, Port of Tauranga, New world, Subway and KFC to learn about their training programmes. They also attended various taster days where they experienced hands on learning.

Early Childhood is a 2 year course with students achieving the National Certificate in Early Childhood Education and Care level 3 at the end of year 13. Year 13 students had a trip to the Rotorua Maternity Annex where they saw the Special Care Unit and the birthing rooms and then they joined the Diploma in Early Childhood Education class at Wairiki Polytech where they had a hands on session making resources. All students have had lots of hands on assessments at Tickle and Happy Times Day Care Centres in Te Puke.

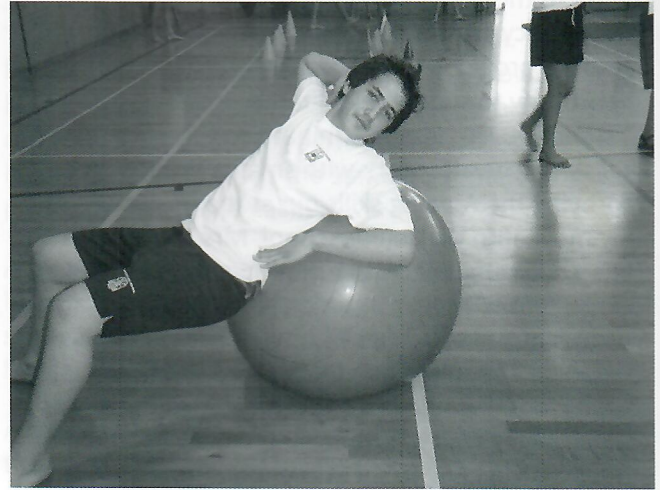
Year 12 and 13 Sports Leadership- the skills that they have displayed in coaching and management of students at Te Puke Primary School.

Congratulations everybody on an excellent year and I look forward to even greater things next year.

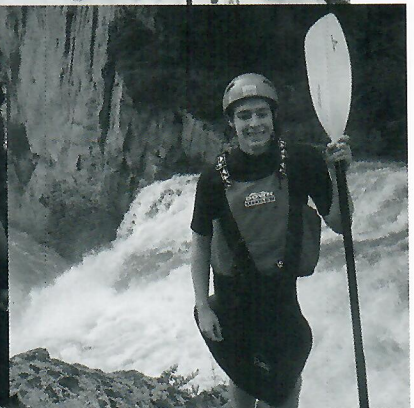
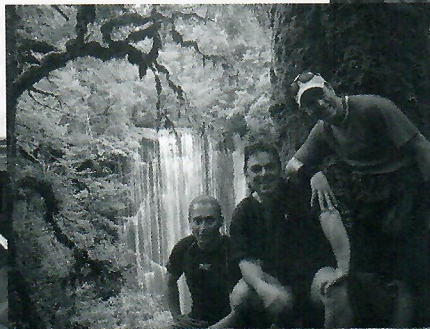

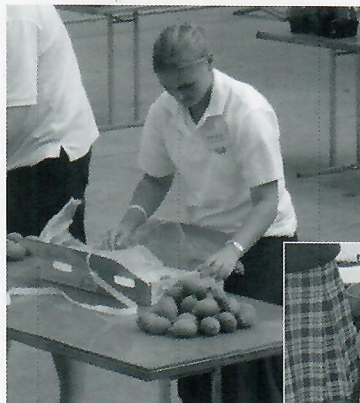
There was a presentation from the Fruitgrowers about all the job opportunities that you can get with horticultural qualifications and their life experiences.

Grease

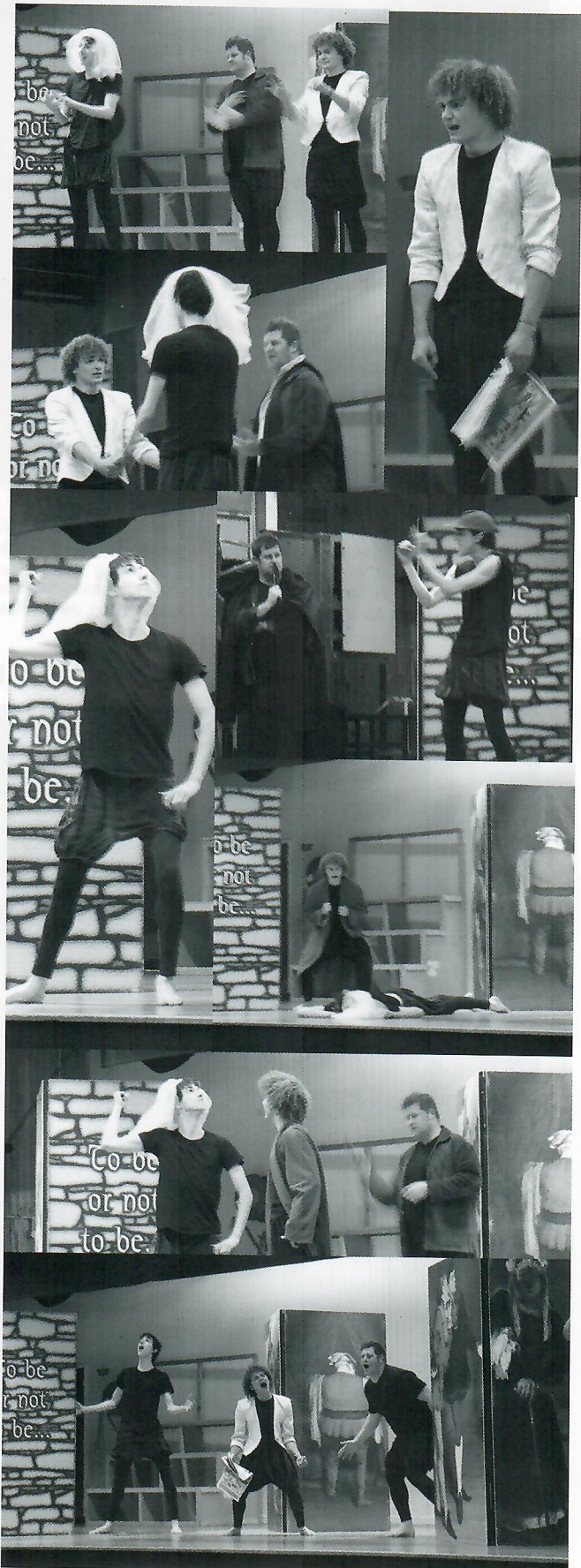
