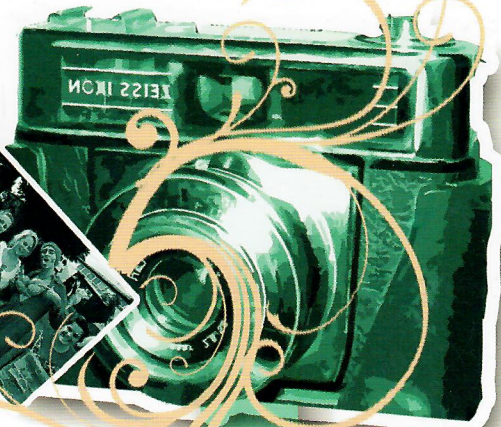

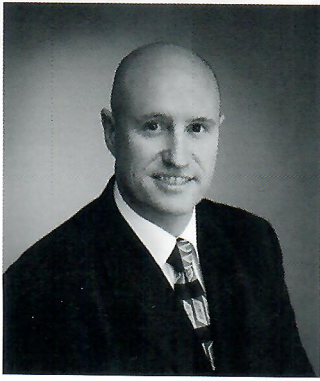

Principal's Report



2010 will go down in the history of Te Puke High School as the start of a new decade and a year that provided staff and students with some major challenges and major steps in our development as a truly great school.

The year started well with the school roll continuing to grow above predictions and students were showing good engagement in learning. We celebrated our senior students' very good performance in NCEA.

Term One will also be remembered for the time when COWs came to Te Puke High School. To mark the next stage in our school's ICT development, 240 Netbooks were introduced into classrooms as tools to improve our students' learning and achievement, bringing the total number of computers available for our students to approximately 500. Te Puke High School students can feel very fortunate to now have technology, which is well in advance of most schools to help them in e-learning.

The school's Core Values (the 4Rs: Respect, Responsibility, Relationships and Reaching Potential) have become embedded within our school culture to help guide the way students and staff work together on a day-to-day basis as we pursue the vision for our school. Every student has been expected to form strong, positive learning partnerships with their teachers and with support from their parents/caregivers focus on improving their learning and achievement. I consider that these learning partnerships are critical for our school to continue to develop a positive, friendly and purposeful learning culture.

In May staff and students had to deal with a very difficult situation when one of our students chose to stab Mr Hose repeatedly in the neck. I want to pay tribute to staff and the Police who worked extremely well together to deal with the immediate response to this serious incident. I also want to pay tribute to the vast majority of our wonderful students who worked with staff

to maintain regular routines as soon as possible. In particular, I wish to honour Mr Steve Hose, who ensured the safety of his students above his own personal safety. As the media swarmed our school they showed little respect to students and staff as they tried to gather any information to feed the story they wanted to create about our school and our community. Their actions caused me to question the morals of the media and ask whether the media report news or create 'news'. Students and staff learnt some sobering lessons about the dark side of the media. In dealing with the adversity of this serious incident students and staff have become more united and have a much stronger belief that Te Puke High school is a great school.

At the end of Term 2 a cast of 80 students presented this year's school production Little Shop of Horrors, ably led by Jeremiah Hill-Ruri and Vanessa Pokaia, who really stole the show. This challenging musical was enjoyed by families and friends over five nights was a great success due to the commitment and enthusiasm from actors, musicians, crew, support parents and staff.

July was another significant month in this year's calendar when our Year 12 and 13 students held an outstanding school ball, which was the result of a year of hard work by the industrious organising committee. Hundreds of people from the Te Puke community turned out to watch our students arrive and walk the red carpet to the Te Puke Memorial Hall. Many staff came to enjoy the experience.

Unfortunately, an extremist political party tried to spoil our celebration by stirring up a national media storm over the contents of a support gift bag given to students by the action groups Students Against Driving Drunk and the Student Health Committee. The purpose of this student-led initiative was to support fellow students to make safe and sensible choices on the night of the ball. I think our students have thought responsibly about issues facing teenagers and I'll support their mature thinking to help solve a teen problem. It's a shame the extreme political party and national media don't have the same mature approach to solving teen problems.

During June our school was visited by the University of Waikato's Te Kotahitanga research team, who assessed the quality of our teachers' professional practice and found it to be of such a high calibre that a film crew returned in September to film some teachers for a video to help train teachers in other schools.

In September I was fortunate to attend Te Karanaga o te Rangatahi Festival at Te Puke Intermediate, which showcased M ori Performing Arts for schools in the Te Puke region. The festival was fantastic and demonstrated the spectacular rise of our Kapa Haka group under the leadership of Claudine Waitere and Jamie Roberts over the last six months.

I have no doubt that we have something special at our school; something which I have not witnessed at any other school. When visitors come to our school they often comment on the warm and friendly relationships between staff and students and the positive productive learning culture in our school. I want to thank staff and the vast majority of students for their contribution as we continue the development of our school as a truly great school.

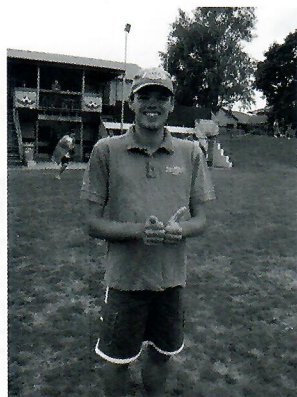

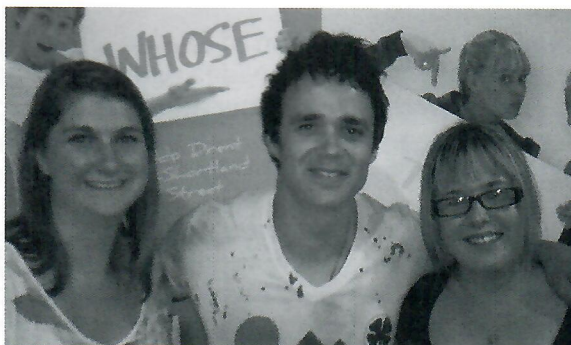

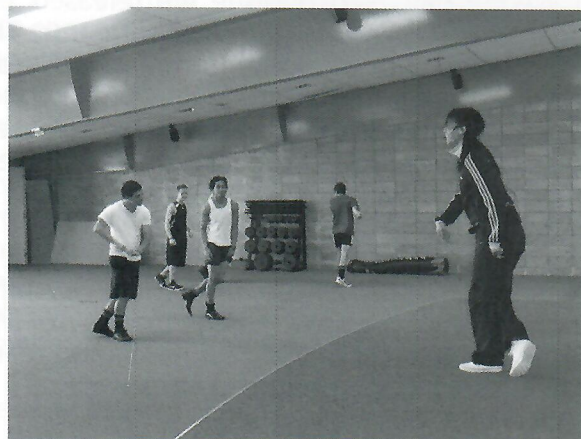
Year 11 Skills for Living

Sell 2010 was great. Over the course of three days we were sorted into teams to design and market a non-existent product, just as



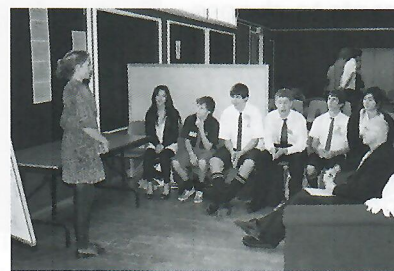
a concept to a panel of judges from local businesses. The short time frame meant that tasks had to be completed and at times caused some stress. This is a good portrayal of the real business world and

I.T Achievements



•266 Netbook computers deployed in 17 Trolleys. Each trolley is called a COW "Computers on Wheels". These have proven to be successful; and have basically removed the need for bookable labs. All departments access to ICT technology more readily available with most

departments having their own COW trolley.

•802.11N/G Mixed mode wireless network from Ruckus been added to our network at the beginning of the year (1 x Zone Director and 18 access points) for the Netbooks (Cows on Wheels) primarily. This has also proven to be helpful for teachers to be connected to this as well. Good example is Professional development sessions and meetings in the library and staff room where teachers can bring their laptops along and be on the network.

•We have allowed for facilities to enable students to bring their own netbooks and laptops to school. We continue to invest in our research of future tech and application in learning. We encourage students to invest in netbook hardware technology.

•New servers been implemented including New Domain Controller and New Firewall running ISA 2006. We continue to advance our server technology, making our network state of the art with server equipment.

•Our server pool now stands at 16 x Rack Servers, 1 x NAS Unit, 1 x Apple Server, 3 x Normal Servers. In total, including virtual server images, we have 25 + servers.

•We introduced Watchdog Internet Protection which is recommended by the Ministry for ,Web Protection.

•Moodle and Mahara use has increased as more Staff and Students get into it. We are continuing to advance on this as we add more Mods from teacher requests.

•Upgrading operating systems on all Netbooks, teachers' laptops and computers as we move to Windows 7 will continue.

•More cameras now installed onsite for security surveillance. Dramatically increased for student and staff safety; reduced incidents on vandalism and graffiti.

•Introduced a new property management software with mixed results; has features that include a new log-a-job system and security scanning system to scan the netbooks out to students. We continue to look for software that delivers quality services and outcomes to staff and students.

•Moved towards Sharp Copiers and printers with a new version of Paper Cut. Sharp copiers allow us to run the latest technology across all platforms without any incompatibility issues. The new copiers and printers have proven a success and allowed us the use of state-of-the-art technology in printing.

•Created a new computer suite in Art. We are looking at upgrading this for even better technology for next year, as well as the prospect of introducing another Graphics lab.

•Moved new ICT Office, which has allowed better productivity, manageability for staff and generated better ideas for ICT developments this year.

•New Panasonic phone system put in which has allowed better communication system to all staff with phone messages being emailed to all.

•Tupaea Rolleston has joined our ICT Team. He has proven to be very good and has the makings of a good ICT technician.

These are the major projects taken place for this year. Next year we plan to do some of the following:-

•Implement a new email server running Exchange 2010. This will give us a more effective email with better handheld device support.

•Set up a Radius Server for Wireless to make wireless security even better than before.

•Windows 7 or Server 2008 on every workstation

•Upgrade Art lab and Music Lab with new computers.

•Possibility of another Graphics lab for game development and better video editing tools.

•Upgrade old existing computers in the school with thin clients.

and river goddess Sarah O'Dea (yes, just one girl) camped by the Waitawheta River with ex-student Jaz Reid and her mate, Rebecca.

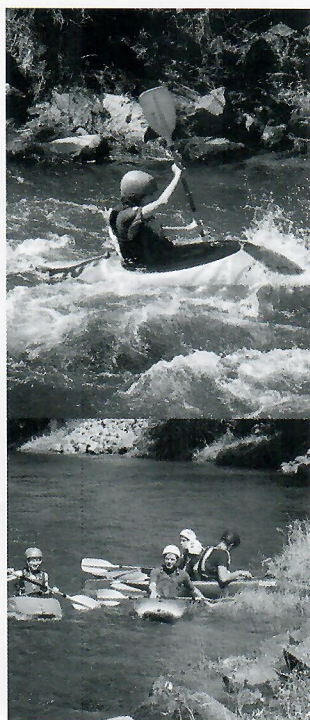
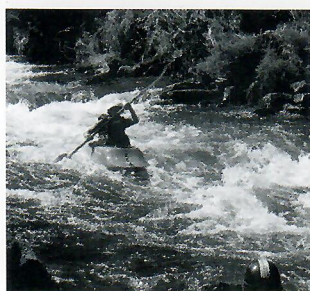

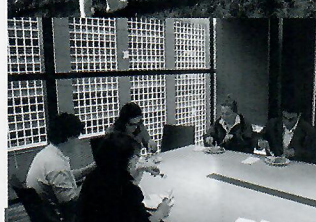
A small combo group has also been formed to create a format for students to do their group performance. The concert band spends Term Four preparing for prize giving.

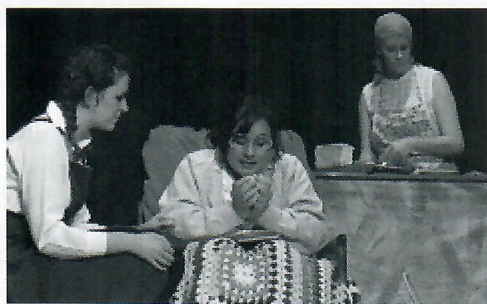

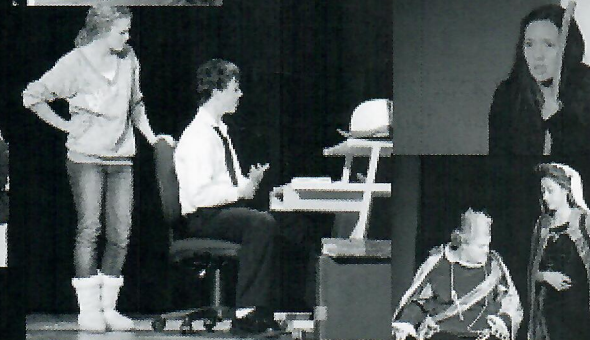
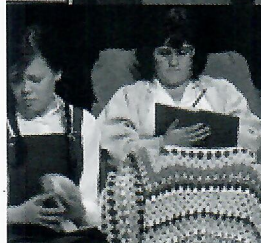
New Standards for 2011

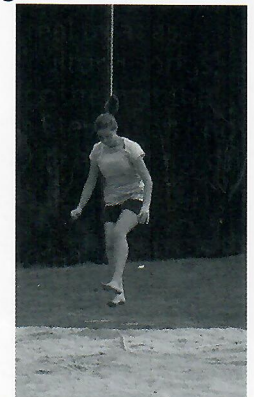

A lot of thinking, creativity, collaborative work has gone into producing a range of high quality products.



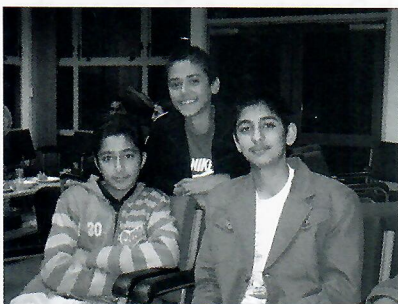

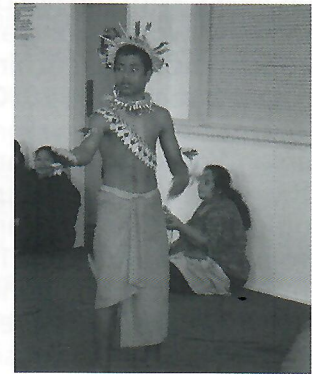

requirements of schooling in New Zealand, along with the expectations at Te Puke High School.

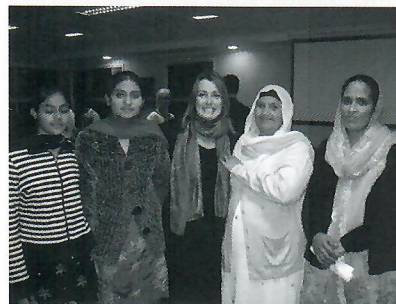


In July Te Puke High School staff

With the fire being last years news, staff have worked long and hard to organise programmes and teaching facilities for students to have a successful 2010.

Junior Workshop programs have taken advantage of our computer suite to complete the research and design sections of programmes while Year10 DTM students worked enthusiastically on our new scooter project and have learnt a wide range of practical skills while producing a fun project. The Y10 DTW students designed a body for a model radio-controlled car, made the plug and then used our new plastic moulding machine to produce some really cool bodies.

Senior Engineering students followed the Tools 4 Work Programme which uses industry-based Unit Standards for assessment. Students successfully produced a diverse range of projects, such as animated wind-powered whirlygig, gear knobs and a sophisticated torque wrench.

Senior Furniture Making classes had the privilege of using the latest jointing technology. Our Domino jointing machines really helped our students produce some fantastic furniture items. Tables, storage cabinets, jewellery boxes and even a bar stool were produced to a high standard. We use BICTO and FITEC industry based Unit Standards for assessment, with students gaining credits, credits and more credits.

Automotive classes were once again very popular. Mr Muller has upgraded this course with new fuel injected engines to work on. Students really get down and dirty in this area, stripping 2 & 4 stroke engines and diagnosing running problems.

Junior Graphics students learnt a host of new skills, producing 2D, 3D and instrumental drawings and used our CAD programme along with photoshop to complete their media and product design brief assignments.

Senior Graphics had a demanding year, with students designing a motor home layout, model making and product design briefs. Students had the opportunity to enter the YIA (Young Innovators Award) competition, where our students won two awards: Creativity Award to Tyla Blaymires, and Josh Bruderer, Devon Campney and Nicolas Ross won the Sustainability Award. Y13 students were working with an actual client on a variety of projects including a house, pool and paint-ball gun design.

Te Kotahitanga is a research-based project that began in 2001. It was undertaken by the Maori Education Research Institute at the School of Education, University of Waikato, and the Ministry of Education's Poutama Pounamu Research and Development Centre in Tauranga.

The project began by interviewing many Maori students, as well as their parents and some school principals, to find out what kind of teaching works best for Maori students. The information gleaned from these interviews formed the basis of the Te Kotahitanga professional development programme in which every TPHS teacher now participates.

The goal of this programme is to improve teacher practice and Maori student engagement and achievement.

What happens at TPHS

Within this project all teachers at TPHS are observed each term by a trained facilitator while they teach a class, usually at Year 9 or 10. A feedback session with the facilitator follows, during which classroom observation evidence is discussed, and the teacher establishes a personal teaching and learning goal that will benefit their students. The next step in the process is a co-construction meeting with a small group of teachers who bring evidence that demonstrates how they are reaching their goal. Both teachers and students are informed about Te Kotahitanga and they are also surveyed to get feedback that informs future practice.

Te Kotahitanga aims to raise the achievement of Maori students by:

- improving or maintaining positive relationships with Maori students;
- fostering culturally responsive educational contexts for Maori students' learning;
- providing a balance of traditional and discursive teaching interactions;
- showing that we have improved Maori students' learning.

Te Ringa Awhina

This year the Special Education Unit has had fifteen students on its roll ranging from year 9 through to 13. It has been a full and busy year with the unit having covered areas of academics, life skills and sports. We have our own individual programmes of Maths, Literacy, Correspondence and SPEC (South Pacific Education Services). Cooking, Art, Technology and Computers have been run for our students in those mainstream areas as well as individuals going to mainstream classes.

As in previous years we have been involved this year in Special Olympics and have represented Te Puke High School in football, 10 pin, basketball and recently athletics. The staff too enjoy these occasions.

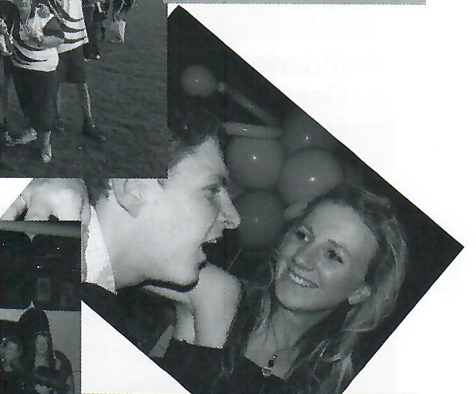
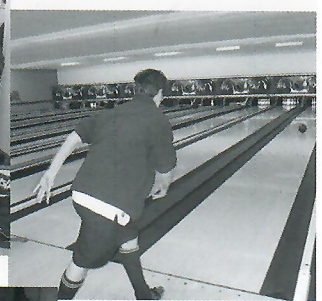

They were, Candyce Eltringham, Yvonne Cruze and Daniel Partridge. This was a first for our unit and will be a start to a yearly inclusion.

The school ball was attended by six of our senior students, arriving by bus and a tractor to a great reception. They all enjoyed the atmosphere where they mingled and danced the night away. Some of our students have been attending work experience that has included the Te Puke Library, Pawprints Kennels and Cattery and Te Puke Bakery. A big thank you must go to the students that came along to the unit to help supervise our students during the year for our mentoring programme.

One of our students received an Achievement of Merit at the Gateway prize giving one of only six presented, so well done Candyce. Mr Valentine was away for a term earlier this year recouping from surgery and is back on deck and keen to get to as many board meetings as possible.

This year our annual camp is a five day excursion to Wellington where we will be doing a number of educational and fun activities. These will include visits to Te Papa, the Zoo, Carter Observatory, a Fish'n'Chip Cruise and the Beehive. Our thanks to the local businesses who contributed to our fundraising and enabled us to achieve the target of \$11,500.

We wish the students who are leaving (three at this stage) all the best for the future and the staff a well-earned and relaxing break, ready for an exciting 2011.

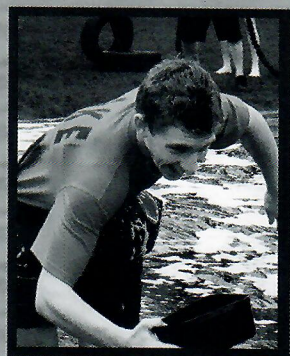

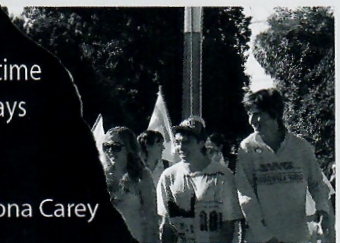
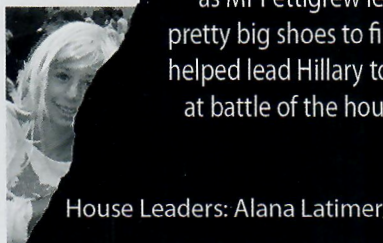

Athletics Day

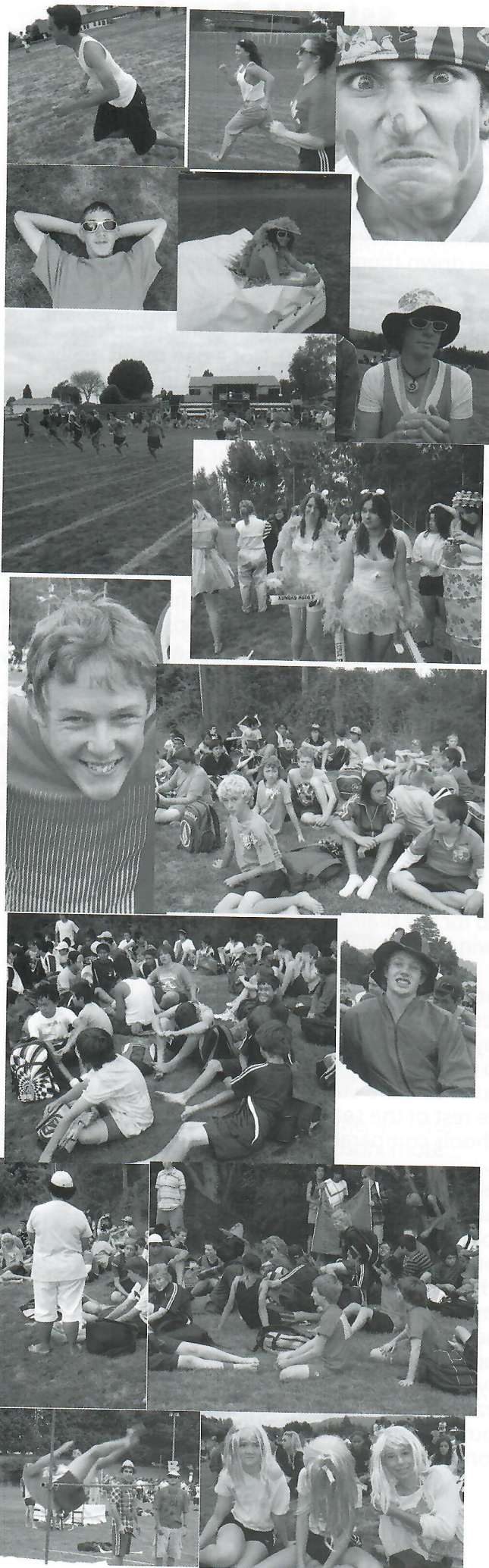

Girls Rugby

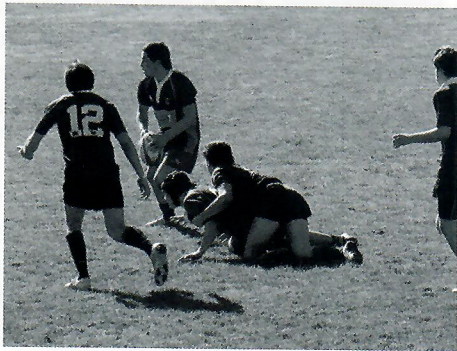
Rugby – Girls XV

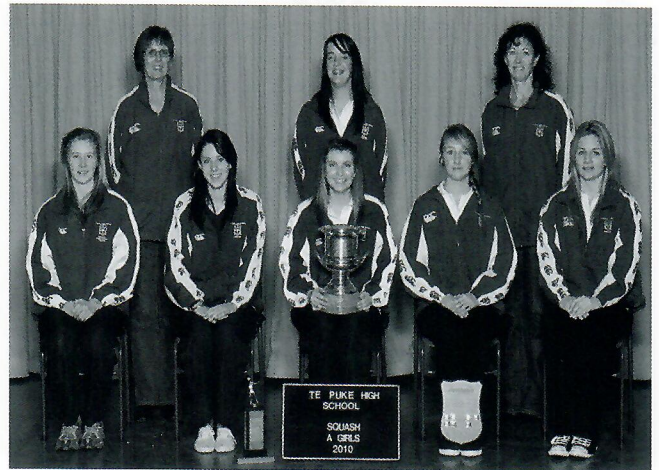

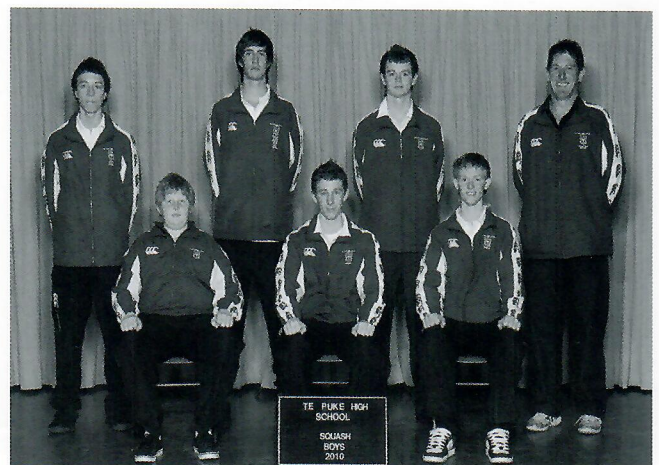

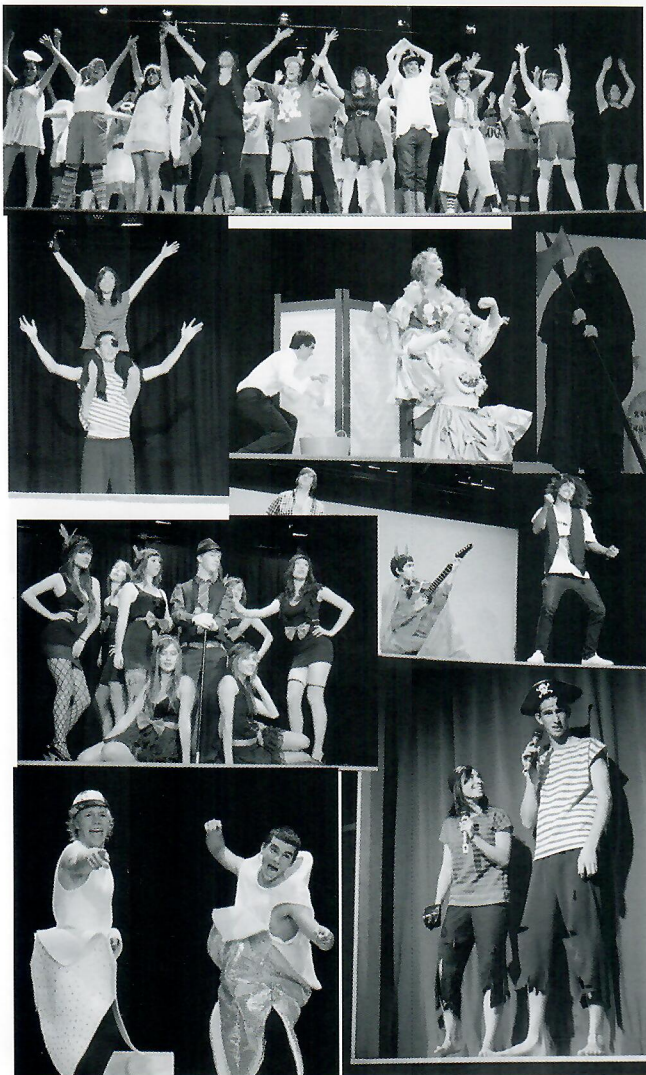
Lip Synch
