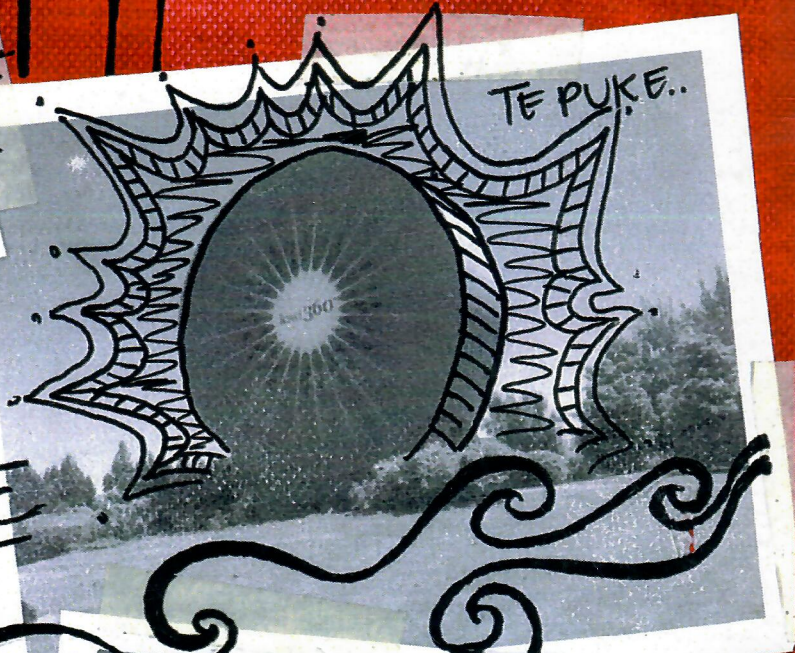

Principal's Report

In the Blink of an Eye

The end of 2011 marks something special for me. Just like the Year 13 students who started in 2007, I have invested the last five years of my journey through life at Te Puke High School. In many ways it seems like yesterday when the current Year 13 students were welcomed to Te Puke High School. Yet so much has happened within 'the blink of an eye'.

As a school we have undergone significant development over the past five years. As a school we have experienced some things that I would not wish on anyone else. However, all experiences, positive and negative, have helped to shape who we are as a school and given us a strong sense of where we want to go.

I will remember 2011 as a relatively 'normal' year. It is the first year, as Principal of Te Puke High School, that I have not had to deal with an extraordinary event. Staff and senior students started the year by celebrating the very pleasing results in NCEA. In fact they are the best results for overall achievement since records began being kept in 2004. Particularly pleasing was the consistent achievement by almost all demographic groups; Male, Female, Māori, NZ European, Māori Male, Māori Female, NZ European Male and NZ European Female. The significant improvement was a good indication that we are on the right track. We are a school on the rise.



In Term Two it was a great pleasure and privilege for me to accompany this year's twenty-four Year 11 students and two teachers to Singapore on our school's annual Twinning Programme with North Vista Secondary School. I want to congratulate all the Te Puke High School students who were fortunate enough to be involved in the 2010-2011 Twinning Programme. You represented your families, your school and your country well.

If I was to sum up much of my focus for 2011 it was to continue developing our school's focus on improving learning and achievement. Most of my effort went into the development of the Small Groups Approach which will be implemented in 2012. This initiative has the potential to significantly enhance our school culture and from my perspective signals the next stage of the development of our school towards becoming a truly great community of learners.

To all our students, whether you are leaving Te Puke High School or returning, I challenge you to become passionate about learning and value it as an investment for your future. This is especially important during these tough economic times. Your country needs you to achieve your best. Your school needs you to achieve your best. Your family needs you to achieve your best. But most importantly, I want you to achieve your best for yourself. Avoid aiming for doing just enough; you have the ability to achieve almost anything you really want if you have the right attitude, the passion and work hard. Aim for excellence in everything you do and enjoy the success that comes from achieving your best. 'The world is your oyster'.

When visitors come to our school they often comment on the warm and friendly relationships between staff and students and the positive, productive learning culture in our school. 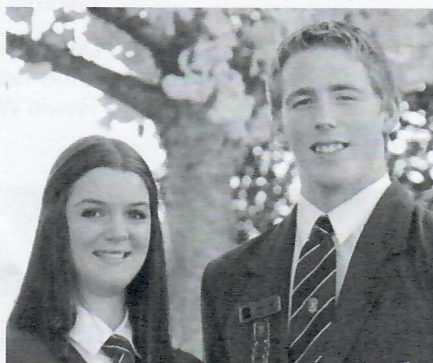

Library Report

It is with pleasure that I am able to announce that the library is still in good heart, despite having been a chronic leaky building for five years, and is used regularly by individual students and whole classes from across the curriculum. With the advent of COW's (Computers On Wheels) in 2010, new challenges of storage and distribution arose and new systems had to be implemented. These are operating smoothly. We have three cows (each holding sixteen portable netbooks), two for use by classes who have booked into IC2 or IC3 for research and one for Years 12 and 13 Study students. All the netbooks are wireless operated, which gives them the advantage of being able to be used anywhere in the library.

All English classes are timetabled into IC1 (Information Centre, Room 1) on a fortnightly basis. With the increased demand for students at all levels to gain credits in NCEA for Wide Reading, it is noteworthy that the library currently has over 12,000 books for them to choose from. A rich literacy selection indeed! At full capacity, the four rooms can, and regularly do, accommodate one hundred students at any given time. Year 13 have IC4 at their disposal for study. This cosy, twelve-seater room provides a quiet space for our most senior students to practise the 4Rs promoted by our school: Respect for others in a working environment, Responsibility for their own work habits, Relationship building with their peers and an excellent opportunity for Reaching Potential in their high school education. The library staff, Mrs Wort and Mrs Boyd, and the student helpers work hard to present the library in a



tidy and readily accessible way and pride ourselves on seeking to satisfy the demands of staff and students. This year, only one Year 13 student, Jenni Turner, made herself available for service to the library but she was ably supported by nine younger students. The library has always been open at lunchtimes for reading, study and playing chess or Scrabble but this year, at the request of the Board of Trustees, it was also open at Morning Interval. While this time slot has not been greatly utilised by students, it is hoped that it will be more popular in later years. Therefore, its availability will continue in 2012.

2012 will also herald in a new era at Te Puke High School. Funding has finally been approved by the Ministry of Education for our long-awaited rebuilding plans. How exciting it is to look forward to a non-leaky library at last!

Peer Support has been going on in NZ for 20 Years. It is a well established strategy for student leadership in Te Puke High and has been running here for 13 years. In January 2011 Year 13 students offered their holiday time to the school by attending a 3 day leadership camp at Tui Ridge.

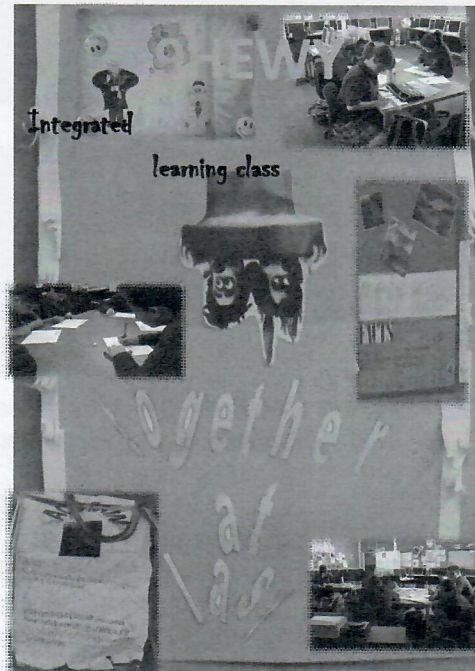

Term 4 we are creating our own tasks linked with two Blooms and three ways we learn best.

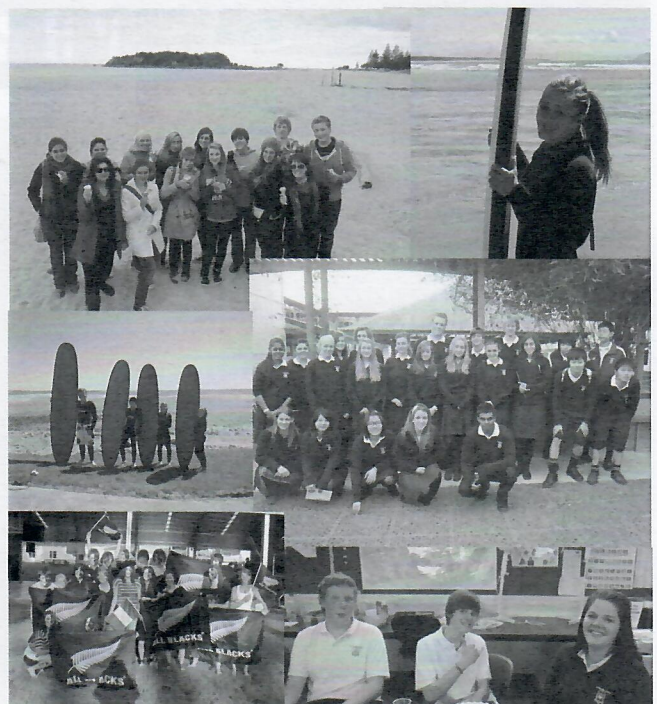
We all feel like we have improved this year by extending ourselves and using the 4 Rs and key competencies.

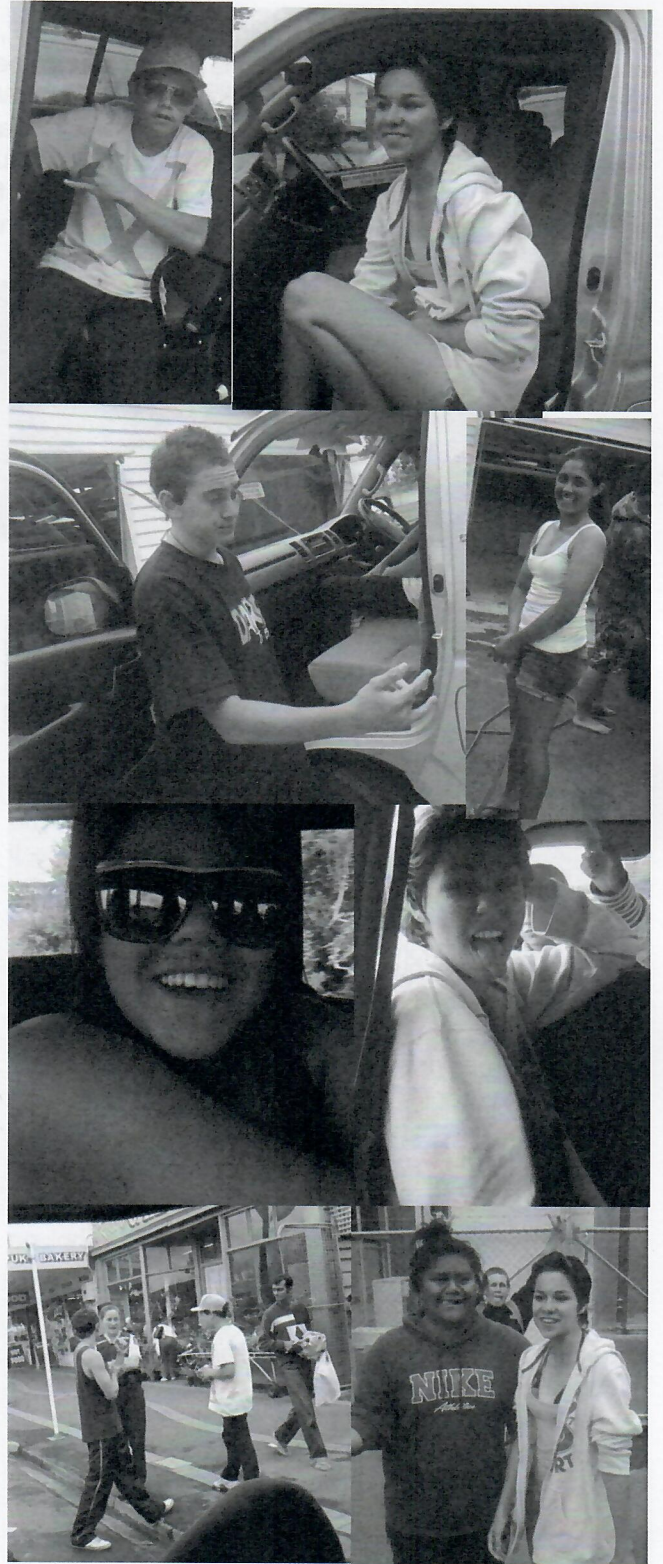

There are very few intervals and lunchtimes where we don't have a number of students in the Department enjoying the facilities we have to offer to access careers information, complete C.V.s, register for courses and trips etc. This is what makes it such a dynamic and positive place to be.

Careers Education is about preparing for the 'real world', helping students to acquire the skills and knowledge to enable them to make sound decisions around their career pathway in the future and hopefully to assist them to see the relevance of school to their future aspirations! 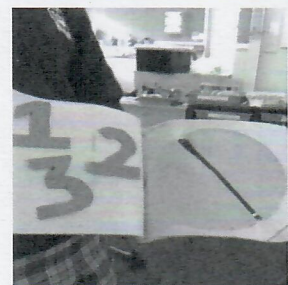
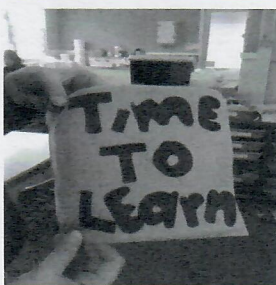

Technology

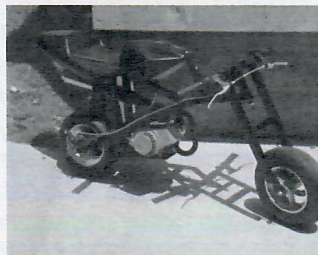
The Technology department started 2011 fully staffed and resourced. Mr Murden departed mid year and we were fortunate to have Mr Tatley join the department.

Badminton

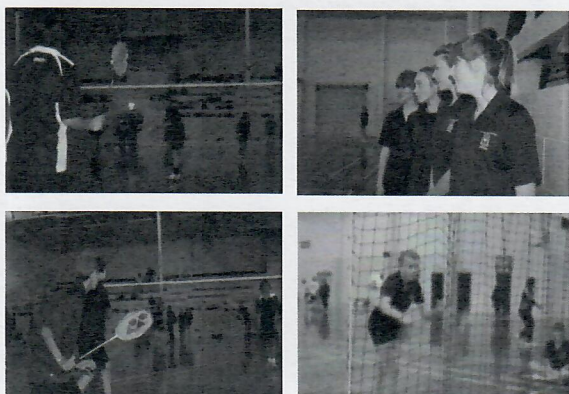
Junior Badminton

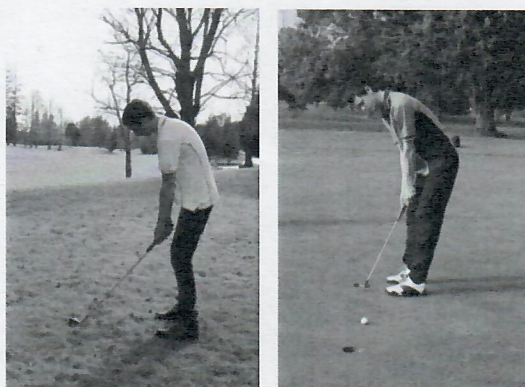


Golf

Our first tournament was a preseason bay wide tournament which went extremely well with us girls coming out second overall. This gave our confidence boost as we were happy with that placing.

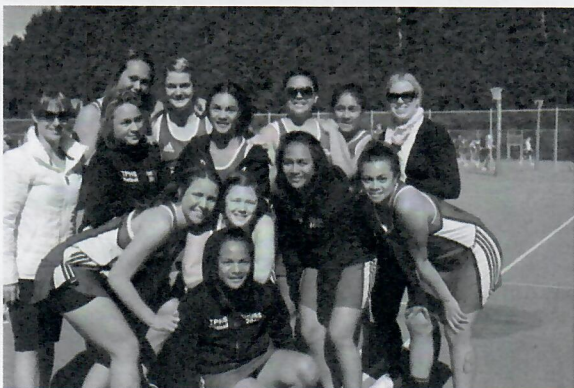

The feature of this year's swimming championships, held at the Papamoa pool, has been the strong competition in the junior and under 15 years divisions.

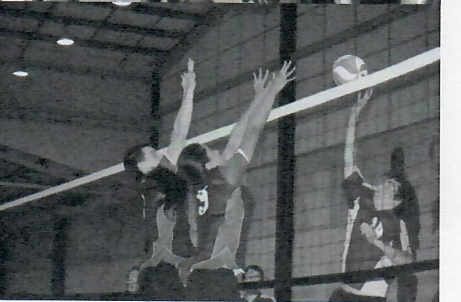
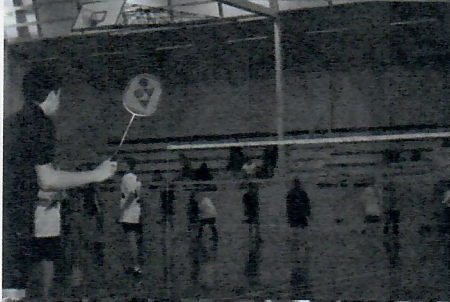
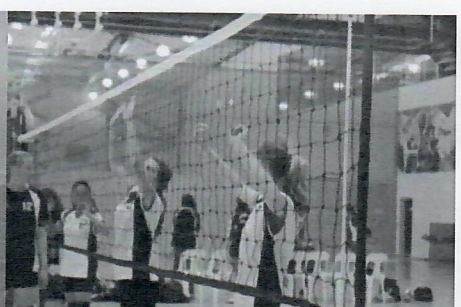
