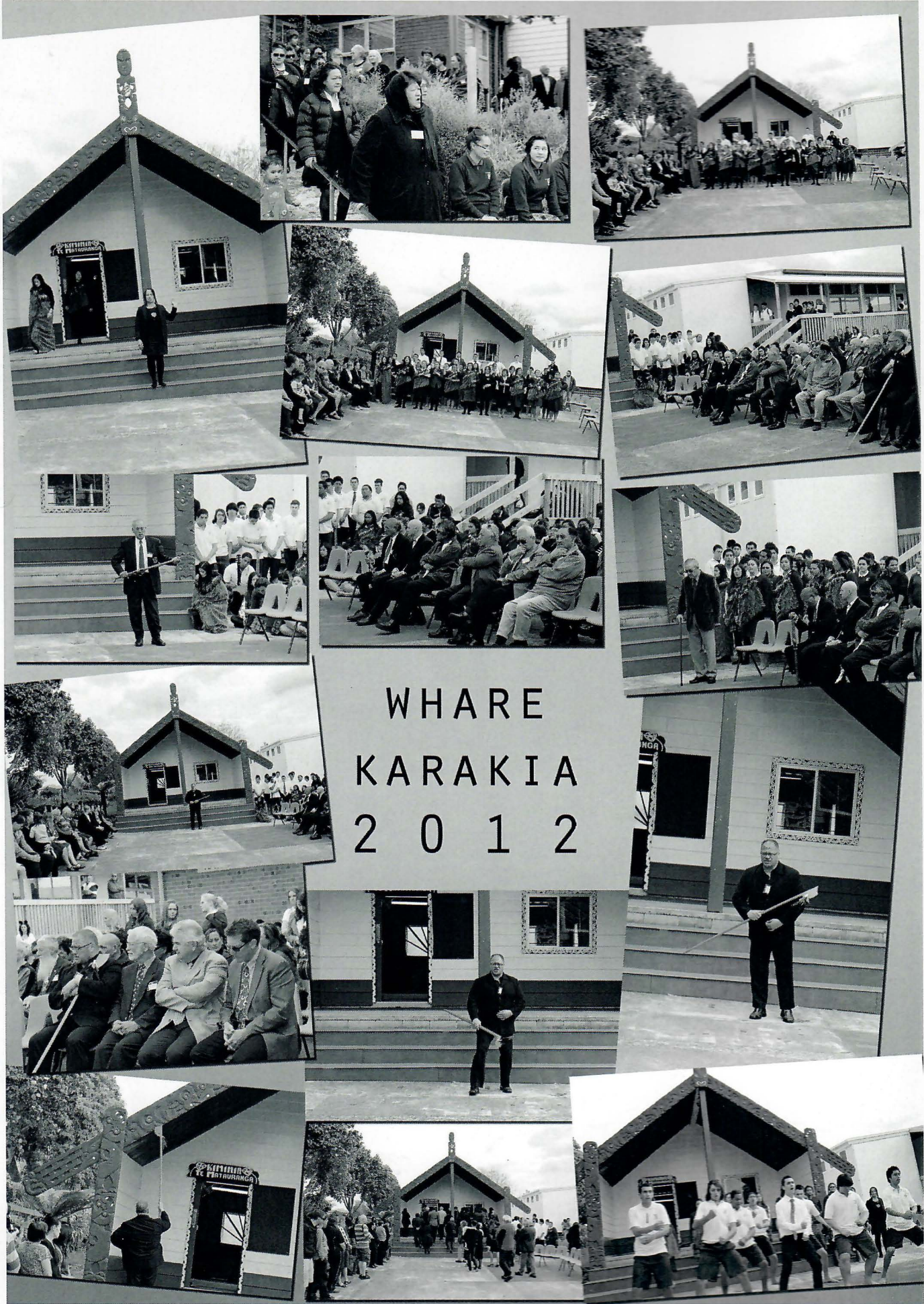

Principal's Report

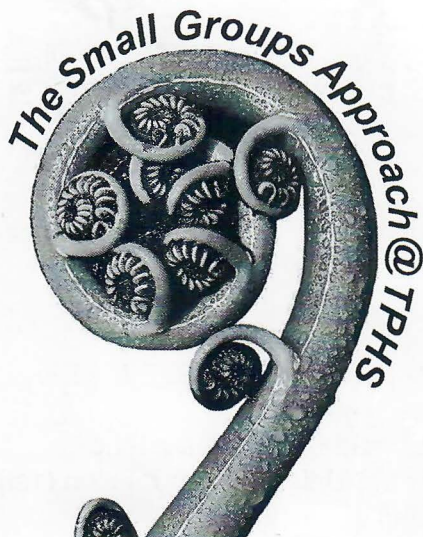
Change and Challenges

If I was to sum up 2012 in two words they would be “change” and “challenges”. This year saw considerable change in the way pastoral care operates at our school for our students. The introduction of the Small Groups Approach at the beginning of this year has brought about a significant change in the way we provide pastoral care for the students of Te Puke High School.

From the beginning of this year form classes did not operate. Instead, approximately 70 Small Groups met every day for at least 20 minutes. Each Small Group was made up of approximately fifteen Year 9 to 13 students and a staff member from the same house. Throughout this year students and staff of each small group have engaged in various activities to build them as a team and to help develop supportive relationships amongst their members.

There is no doubt that the introduction of the Small Groups approach has been challenging for students and staff who may not have worked together. Despite these challenges, the introduction of the Small Groups Approach is beginning to show its potential. The vast majority of feedback from students, staff, parents and the community has been very positive. As the year progressed, students developed greater ownership of their groups and started to develop supportive inter-level relationships between senior and junior students. This would never have happened with the previous form class system.

I have no doubt that the potential of the Small Groups Approach will not be fully realised for a while to come. I believe the introduction of the Small Groups Approach @ TPHS has the potential to make a significant difference to our students' sense of identity, belonging and purpose at our school. The ultimate success of the Small Groups Approach @ TPHS is dependent on all of us working together to make it effective. At the end of the day it is students and staff working together that will make a difference.



To all our students, whether you are leaving Te Puke High School or returning, I challenge you to become passionate about learning and value it as an investment for your future. This is especially important during these tough economic times. Your country needs you to achieve your best. Your school needs you to achieve your best. Your family needs you to achieve your best. But most importantly, I want you to achieve your best for yourself. Avoid aiming for doing just enough; you have the ability to achieve almost anything you really want if you have the right attitude, the passion and work hard. Aim for excellence in everything you do and enjoy the success that comes from achieving your best. 'The world is your oyster'.

I want to thank staff and the vast majority of students for their contribution as we continue the development of our school as a truly great learning environment.

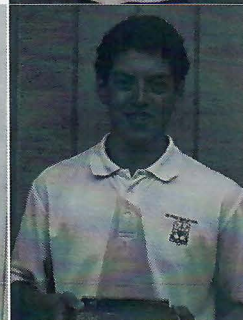

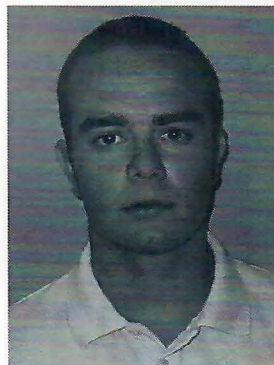

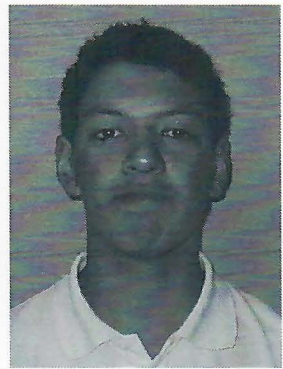
BOT Representative

On Wednesday, the SADD committee walked around the school painting black crosses on people's faces to make them aware of the casualties of alcohol-related accidents.

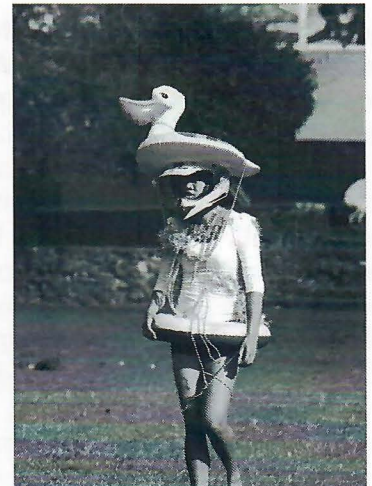


On Thursday, 100 black helium balloons were released and each balloon represented somebody who had died in a car crash involving alcohol.

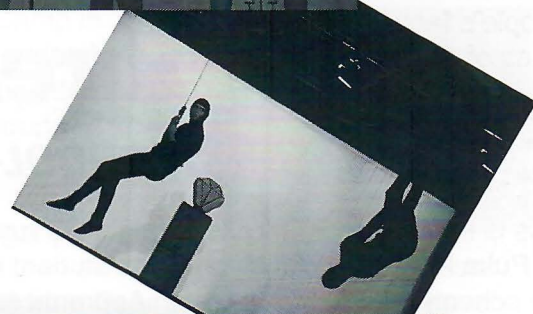


Lip Synch

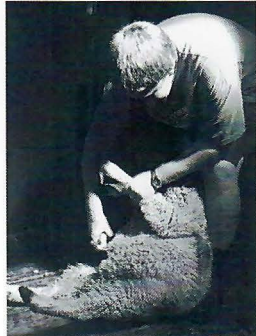

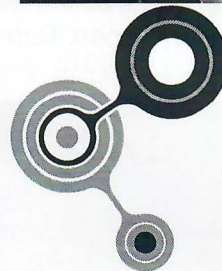

BUILDING SCHOOL-INDUSTRY PATHWAYS



This is the fifth year this programme has run at Te Puke High School with only one student on the scheme this year. The youth Apprenticeship students are focussed on their career paths and are able to be out in the work place up to 3 days per week while working on industry units towards National Certificates in their chosen careers in the classroom.

Testimony from Daniel Phillips:

I have been on the Gateway Programme for the past two years. I have achieved 15 books this year so far in Automotive and Gateway most of which have been Fairview Motors books. My 2011 Gateway Placement was at Master Lotz Automotive.

This year 2012 I have done two Gateway Placements, one at Te Puke Car Care Centre and the other at J&S Automotive enabling me to be out two days a week. This made me eligible for the Youth Apprenticeship Programme, a programme that is an extension to the Gateway Programme.

I have learnt a lot of skills and had many experiences of how the automotive workshop works. I am passionate about automotive engineering and would like to take this further into a career. By doing Gateway and by being placed in a work environment it has made me even more confident that this is what I want to do.

LGBT Support Group

Respect – You may not agree with LGBT and what that represents, but we ask for your respect for who we are.

Responsibility – The LGBT group have formed to offer peer support and awareness within our school community. We have not formed this group to ‘promote’ diverse sexuality, but to provide a forum for students where they can access support.

Te Puke's CACTUS programme kicked off in 2012 with two groups of 25 students committing to eight weeks of early morning trainings and hard work. The organising CACTUS Committee has representation from the Police, Western Bay of Plenty District Council, Te Puke High School Youth Trust Te Puke and the community. Their objective was to design a programme that will benefit the community and school creating a win win situation.

The CACTUS programme is based on an Armed Forces course designed to extend a student's mind and physical capability with a focus on teamwork, goal setting, leadership, overcoming challenges and discipline. Three mornings a week the students are out of bed before sunrise and working out at Te Puke High School gym or other local attractions that offer a challenge.

The instructors, came from Mount Cross Fit, with an impressive military background that includes training the SAS troops. Once the training has been completed the students shower, change into school uniform, have breakfast and head off for their day at school.

Feedback from the students and parents has been extremely positive and encouraging. One excited parent commented that her son was loving the course and gaining in self confidence. Student feedback includes

"Set alarm, got picked up at 5.45. Way too early for me by the way. Usually wake up at 7.30am. Was sort of hard, but it was all good cause I was excited".

"It's intensely challenging, it pushes me to my limit, but at the end of each session I feel motivated and fresh for the rest of the day".

"The week of CACTUS has been great except for the early mornings. I'm usually too tired to do anything in the morning so I get ready the night before".

"I find it very intense but also fun. It's fun to work with other people".

"Today I got picked up at 5.56 from outside my house. We trained real hard and then had a mean breakfast".

"This week of CACTUS was massive (cool) because we did lots of fitness, team work and it has been pretty hard out".

"Woke up at 5.00am, was actually excited".

"Was great, really hard, but great".

"Learnt to pack clothes, lunch, water bottle at night, leave by back door".

The CACTUS programme is very fortunate to enjoy the support of some of our local businesses. Our 'mean' breakfasts are provided courtesy of New World, Countdown and Fresh Market and allow the students to head off to class feeling energised and ready to work.

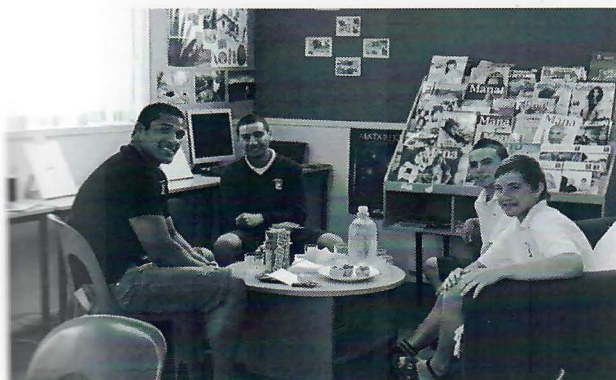

My role is to make a positive difference in the lives of our Rangatahi and I am passionate about helping each and everyone reach their individual potential.

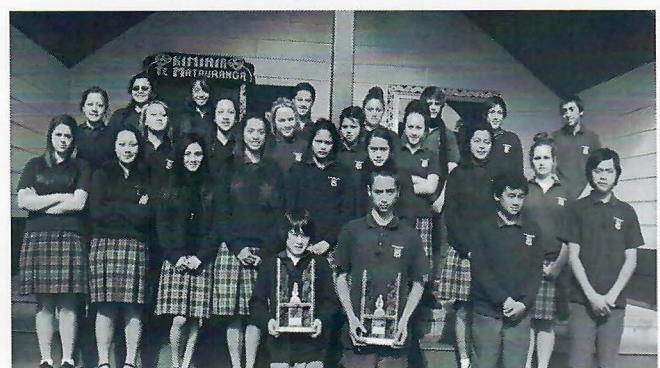

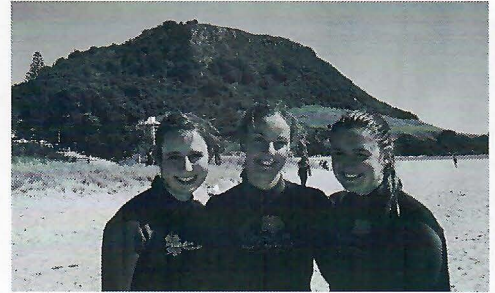


International Students

We are working very hard to introduce relevant, well organised new assessments at Level 2 and Level 3 in line with new NCEA standards.

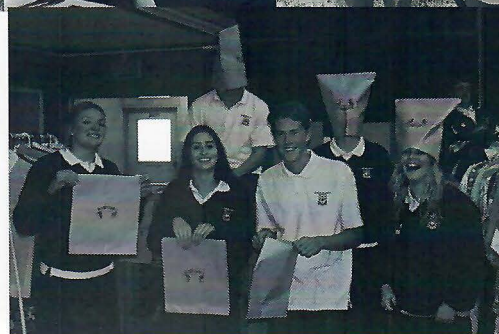

Mathematics

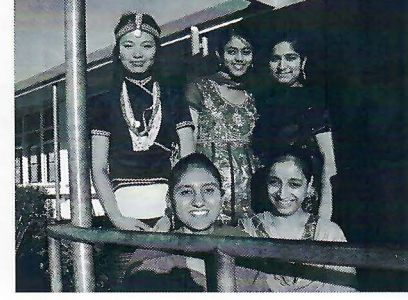
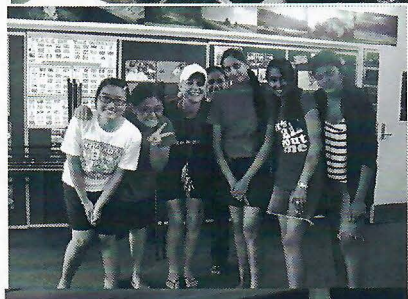
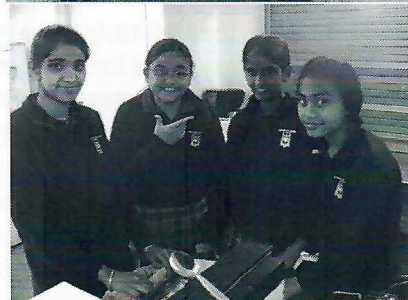

We are looking forward to 2013 and know it will be another fun and rewarding year.



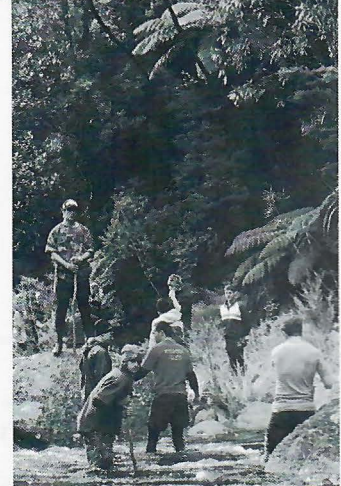
Dance/Drama

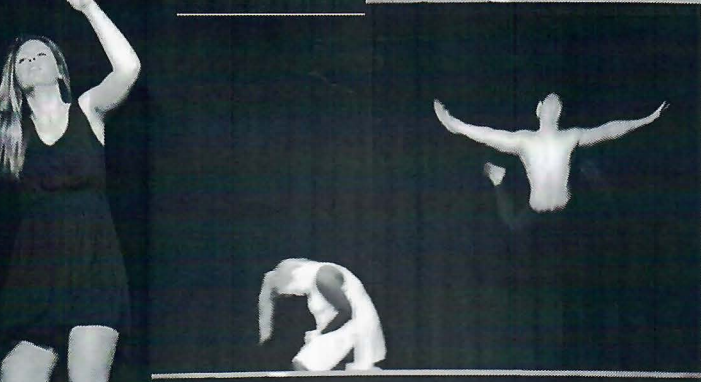
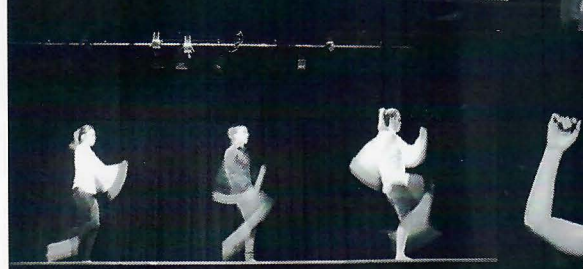
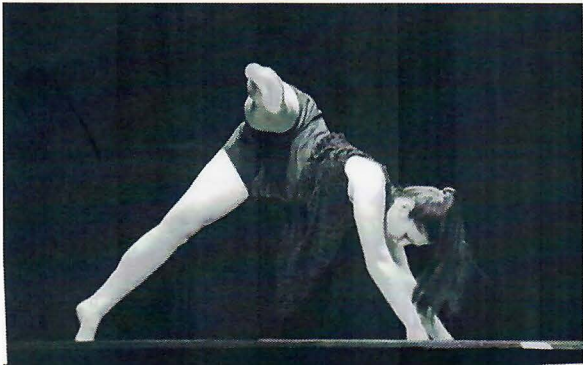


After breakfast at 7am on Monday, we met our mountaineering instructors; David, Billy, Daniel and Tim. We were sorted into our groups and started learning walking techniques on steep slopes and how to self-arrest (stopping yourself sliding down a steep slope with your ice axe). We then began making our snow caves to sleep in the following night. Some groups hollowed out snow banks and others made domes of piled snow and then hollowed them out. To pass our assessment we had to cook our own food in the cave, sleep inside it, and not go back to the hut for any reason until the next morning. On Wednesday after a night of broken sleep, we were assessed on our ability to properly use the mountaineering techniques we were taught. Our instructors took us over several ridges and into various valleys. Due to poor visibility and changing weather, we couldn't go up to the crater lake as our class had planned. Thursday and Friday were spent either skiing or snowboarding. Half the class were learning to snowboard and the rest who were more advanced, headed higher up the mountain which include two skiers. Our group only had one major injury. Holly Walker tore her achilles tendon when getting off the lift with Liana Kokiri. We had cloudy weather that changed quickly but we gained a fresh layer of snow every night and the only problems we had were on Wednesday when the power for the hut cut out, forcing us to cook sausages on our gas cookers. Our evenings were spent playing cards (president) and before we left the car park we had to dig out our vans from the snow before heading back to school.



Alpine was our last camp of the year out of three our whole class was so excited that we were going and couldn't wait till the day. Finally at Mount Ruapehu there was a long enduring first three days of walking and getting wet, cold and frozen toes from rain, iced boots and wet socks. Mean way to start a couple of peoples first time at the snow. We done a lot of snow cave building which is not actually hard but it was good and got to spend more quality time with the team. Dance

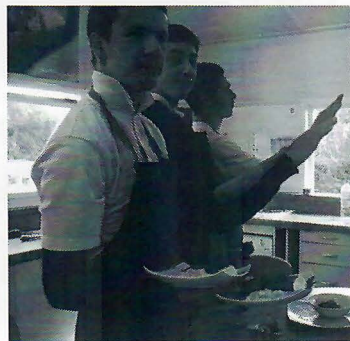


Food Department



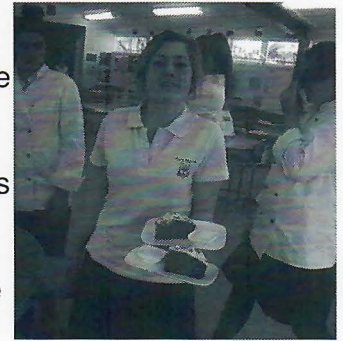

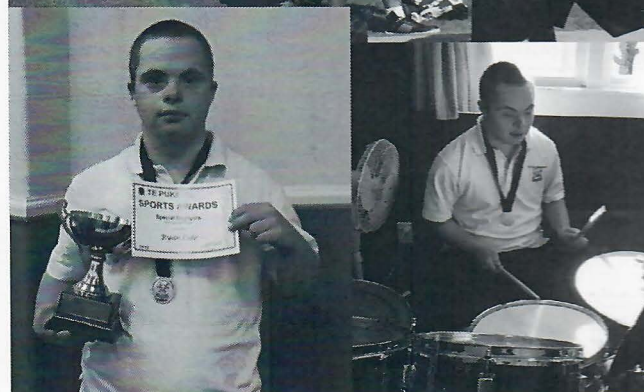

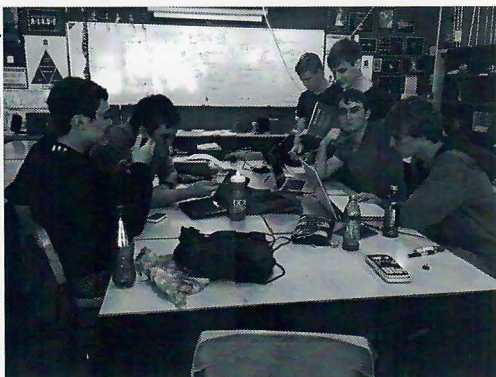

The school entered two teams of Year 13 physics students to the 'New Zealand's Next Top Engineering Scientist competition'. This annual problem solving team competition is organised by the Department of Engineering Science at The University of Auckland and stretched the researching abilities and scientific investigation skills of the team.

The science department is looking forward to 2013 and is excited about reflecting on how to improve our junior schemes further. It will provide an opportunity to consolidate on the work done this year on the Level Two standards. It will also give us the opportunity to plan and create new schemes to fit the new 2013 level 3 standards.

On Saturday the 22nd of September, two groups of brave year 13 physics students (Containing Richard Arana Jones, Jason Keyte, Wang-Sun Allen, Eugene McNearney, Devon Campny, and Michael Scott), undertook a fearsome challenge: going head to head with hundreds of other schools across the country to 'find the projected landing area of a skydiver' in the NZ's Next Top Engineering Scientist competition.

Every group received the challenge via email at exactly 9AM and had until 6PM to answer it, with hopes of winning the \$6000 prize money. "I feel we did quite well in the competition" said Jason Keyte (aged 18) when asked about the competition.

The winner will be announced late October.

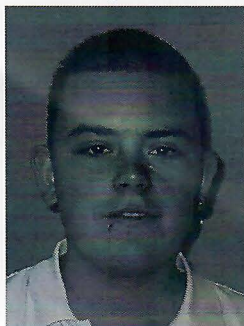
The girls worked very hard this year, practicing every week at baywave as well as dry land training during their lunch break. And with all that hard work our team managed to place fourth in the school competition.

Thankyou to the Manager, Coach and mothers who have helped us through our season. We are looking forward to our next one!

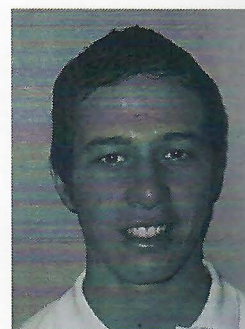
Shooting

Gymnastics

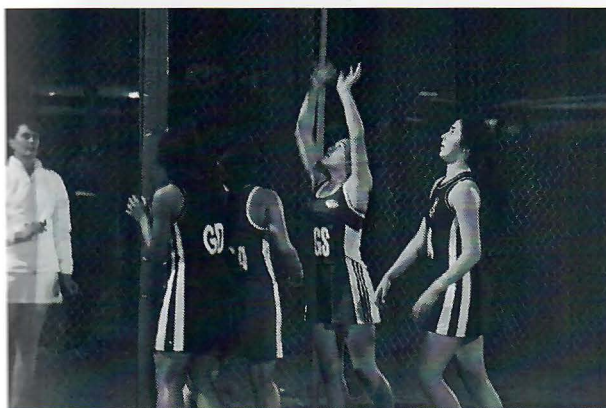

We had to cancel it the first day due to terrible weather but the weather changed its tune and the next day we had an amazing day for swimming sports. We had a great time and I managed to put



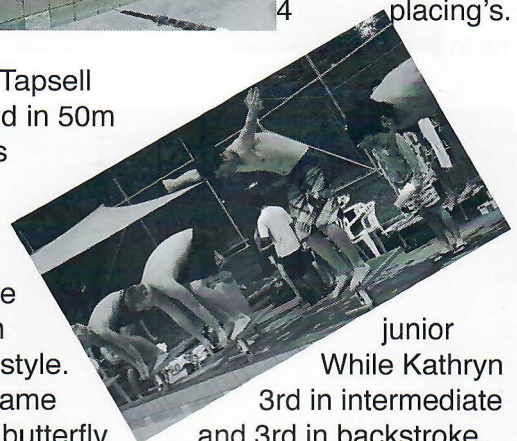
together a strong team to enter in the BOPSS Swimming Champs where the team received 4 placing's.
