## Mr Chris Pointon

A regular educator, to others he seemed to be just another Social studies and Geography teacher. Others knew him to have a son teach at this school as well as two granddaughters come to the school, totaling three generations of Pointon family members at school at the same time. Some may have even known him because their parents had been taught by him. Just like other teachers he would turn up to school, share his 100 year old knowledge with the students, put up with constant criticism from students, mark well over 100 assessments and by the end of 5th period would often look forward to being back at home.

Though few may have known of his after school activities, he would dedicate his own personal time assisting in our schools Performing Arts performances such as the Te Puke High schools annual Lip Synch, Talent Quest and the ever popular Te Puke High School annual production. Though you rarely see him on stage performing, his masterful skill lay in the backstage work that goes on behind the scenes. A key factor in our schools production and performance popularity is the authenticity of construction

work all hand done by this man. In some cases he has also directed school performances as well as physically created one at the same time.

His personal qualities go far beyond what is required to be a teacher. When in overload work mode during certain parts of the year he demonstrates qualities like his attention to detail, persistence to maintain this detail, a critical thinker under pressure and still very well organized to balance out his before and after school work load and during school time still capable of teaching. His definitive quality that is rarely seen in people was his optimistic personality, always seeing the brighter side of things when times got tough, which is how he is able to do what he simply does best, to help others. How he did this, he would often recollect some ancient yet well-known proverb, a classic example, "Rome wasn't built in a day" which if you can imagine him saying this when something would take a long time to make whether it was a stage extension or even creating new furniture that would only be used once during a scene and never come out again until the next production. This just goes to show his level of commitment to complete a task.

After 28 years of service to the Performing Arts, Mr. Pointon Senior finally ends his teaching career, leaving behind an extensive legacy of his behind the scenes work which he voluntarily took onboard. Now this passes on to a worthy successor capable of maintaining his standard of dedication, historic ancient knowledge of set construction and stage crew work, and optimistic humor ( Thanks Mr. Pointon Junior!). A one of a kind teacher, friend, colleague or how ever else he was known at Te Puke High School, he will be very much missed.

A befitting Maori proverb I would like to leave for him that I know defines him is this, "Waiho ma te tangata e mihi"- let others speak of your greatness. A man of great humility and respect.

## Mrs Michelle Hewson

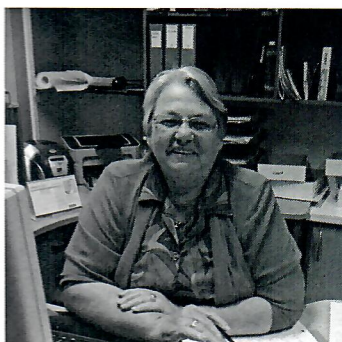

# Principal's Report

This year we have all witnessed the outcomes of a conversation that started with the Ministry of Education in 2007. A conversation about our leaky buildings, about our old prefabs that had passed their used by date, about our Technology building that was destroyed by fire in 2009, and about fixing our infrastructural and system problems - drainage, security, computer network. I feel proud that we as a school have been able to transform this negative package of problems into a positive modern learning environment that is the envy of many schools.



From the start of this year, our school has been a place of learning, a demolition site and a construction zone. This has required flexibility in the way teaching and learning has taken place, with teachers and students being shifted around the campus. I want to take this opportunity to thank staff and students for the way they have worked together over this year to overcome the challenges of our old buildings being demolished and replaced with new ones.

The transformation of our school campus is occurring over four stages. Stage One was completed in term one this year. It included: a modern Technology block (Food Technology, Digital Visual Communication, Automotive, Engineering, Wood Technology, a Computer Suite and Textiles Technology). Stage Two was opened at the beginning of Term Two, which included a contemporary Library and Student Centre, flexible learning pods and modern Science laboratories. Stage Three includes the development of our Modern Learning Environments and the demolition of our old leaky library. During Stage Four the old prefabs that make up the current English block and Horticulture classes will be removed, and a new Horticulture area and Wharenui in the centre of our school campus will be constructed. Stage Four is due to be completed by the beginning of the 2014 school year.

Our school is in a relatively unique position, with a considerable proportion of it is undergoing significant redevelopment to transform it into a 21st Century learning environment. Our staff and students are in a relatively unique position, seeing their school transform in front of them, they have needed to adapt their teaching and learning. It's fair to say that moving into our new modern learning environments has been challenging. As with all change some have adapted quicker than others.

Since May I have witnessed considerable development in the way teaching and learning occurs in our new modern learning environments. I have seen great examples of: students working together, students learning in different ways, students using technology to improve their learning, students being great role models for other students, students learning with other classes through team teaching. I want to applaud the teachers and students who have been the trail blazers in our new learning pods. You have demonstrated the ability to be flexible, problem solvers who have the ability to learn how to learn. These are all attributes of 21st Century learners. Visitors to our school this year have paid tribute to the great learning culture amongst staff and students.

Through taking ownership of their learning and making the commitment to being an active member of our school, our students have the potential to achieve great things at school and throughout the rest of their life. It is through the dedication of our teachers and support staff that makes Te Puke High School a special place. I want to thank all staff for their commitment to our students. In particular, I want to pay tribute to three long-serving staff members who will be retiring at the end of this year; Michelle Hewson who has taught at TPHS for 23 years, Chris Pointon, who have taught at Te Puke High School for 28 years and Diana Nitz who has been in our office administration for 18 years. I thank you for your commitment to our students and school over many years. You have made a significant contribution to a number of generations of students.

In closing I want thank staff and students for their ongoing commitment and contribution as we continue the development of our school as a truly great school. Te Puke High School continues to develop as a school that is small enough to care and large enough to compete.

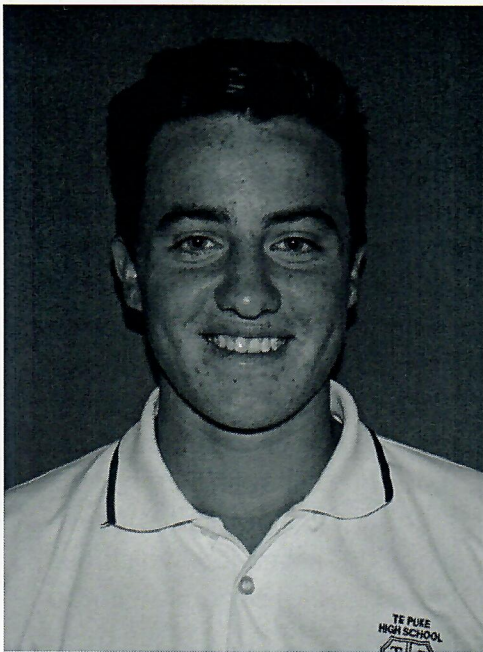
The visit from Prime Minister John Key to our community was an occasion we will never forget in which we learnt more about the political aspect of leadership.

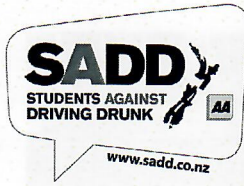


We also had a trip to a Sustainable Backyards youth forum, again we looked at environmental issues but the emphasis was on what was important to our young people and problem solving around these.

# SADD Committee

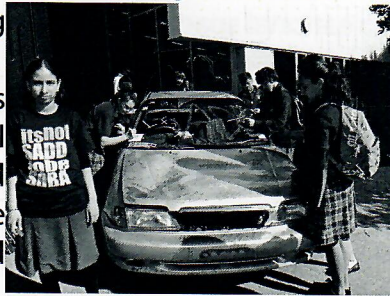


Once again Te Puke High School students have been busy ensuring their fellow students are informed about the effects of alcohol and issues concerning driving

drunk to encourage them to make safe choices if drinking.

SADD (Students Against Driving Drunk) Committee's week long campaign included the following during lunch and interval.

Monday students wrote alcohol related facts and statistics on the paths around school.



Tuesday an obstacle course was set up with fatal vision goggles that simulate varying degrees of alcohol consumption to emphasise how alcohol affects a person's judgment when driving.

Wednesday students were given balloons to represent people who died 119 (black), were seriously injured 572 (red) or affected (yellow) by an alcohol/drug related crash in one year. We went down on the field to remember them and release the balloons.

Thursday the SADD committee members invited students to write on a wrecked car what they would miss if they were killed or injured in a drug/alcohol related crash.

Once again the SADD Committee did a great job raising awareness of the detrimental effects of drink driving.



# 40 Hour Famine

On a weekend in June, over 100 Te Puke High School students took up the challenge to 'Go Hard Out for the Hungry' as they tested their resolve to go 40 hours without food, talking,



a bed or even Facebook (perish the thought!) for those less fortunate. The 2013 World Vision 40 Hour Famine fundraising went to Bougainville, an island located off the coast of Papua New Guinea. Many people of Bougainville are uneducated and malnourished and as a result 1 in 3 die as a result of poverty. Going the extra mile were 28 students who not only went without, but also took part in a sleep over event held at the Te Puke Baptist Church. During the sleep over event the students took part on a number of fun and educational activities such as a quiz about Bougainville, eating only kau kau/sweet potato (the typical daily diet), building cardboard slums to sleep in, watching Slumdog Millionaire and running a car wash. The sleep-over and car wash event raised \$800 and including sponsorships of other students who took part in the famine Te Puke High School raised almost \$3000.

A big thank you must go to Karina Ashby and Awhina Matthews as the student leaders for the famine, along with Melody Tuck, our very own Papua New Guinean! Thank you also to Dane, Patrick



and Leah for their support and time and for the use of the church facilities. We look forward making the 40 Hour Famine bigger and better in 2014 as we strive to put an end to global hunger.

# Librarians Report

The second term of 2013 saw the move of the old library into the new Student Centre, along with the International Department, Careers and Gateway and their respective staff. It also saw the commencement of the new Librarian Mrs Sue Jamieson. Student use has escalated due to the facility being used every interval and lunchtime for students to eat, relax and use the COW's (Computers on Wheels). It has become a place of warm refuge through the winter on wet cold days.



The Student Centre is set up with two distinct areas, a recreational space with comfy chairs and coffee tables and a study space with desks and chairs.

All staff are able to timetable classes in the Centre through the centralised booking system on KAMAR booking either the recreational or study space along with the facility to book the COW's.

There are also 4 breakout rooms available for meetings or quiet study, namely Totara, Kahikatea, Kauri and Rimu.

The total library stock now numbers 11,000 and the project of continual weeding of outdated stock and assessment of replacement stock is ongoing. This total is made up of books, magazines and DVDs.

The Librarian has been assisted every interval and lunchtime by 10 very able Student Librarians who have adjusted quickly and enthusiastically to the new changed environment and we look forward to welcoming some new eager Student Librarians in 2014.

The students have enjoyed the freedom of the new space, it has been well used as a meeting space, learning space and a space for recreation reading and social gathering.

## Summer Church

## My Trip to Devonport Naval Base

On Sunday the 21st of July I headed to the Defence Careers Office in Rotorua to hop on the bus at 1100 to head to Devonport Naval Base in Auckland. When we arrived at the Naval Base at 1700 we got issued with our room keys and the clothes they supplied, a grey top saying Defence Careers Experience and a pair of camouflaged army pants. We then went to our rooms and unpacked and then headed to dinner in The Mess.

Lights out was 2100 and the morning started at 0545 and we had to be changed into our running gear and lined up in our three ranks by 0555. We headed out for a run to the nearest park and did some personal training exercises there till about 0615 then we headed back to our rooms to get changed and have showers before 0630 for breakfast.

After breakfast we got into our groups using the numbers they gave us on our name badges. My group was syndicate 1 and our first activity was going on the Ridged Hull Inflatable Boats (RHIB) so we headed down to the RHIBs to get a run through of what we were going to do and to get a pair of overalls, a lifejacket and a helmet without the visor, as the guy said we had to get a feel of the real navy e.g. the wind and water hitting our faces. Once everyone was checked we hopped on the RHIBs and headed out into the Auckland Harbor and around the Harbor Bridge .

We then regrouped to discuss our next activity which was heading to the Gunnery School where they teach the new recruits how to handle the different guns for combat and for their parades for end of recruitment etc. After we had a tour of the facilities and had a go at stripping and assembling shot guns, we had to get changed into our running gear for an army RFL (Required Fitness Level) which is the 2.4km run. At 0530 we headed to the mess for dinner and they had a wide range of selection, at 0630 we had presentations and we reflected on the day's activities and what tomorrow had planned for us. At 0545 we had another exercise session in the morning before breakfast.

After breakfast we got with our groups again and headed to the safety part of Devonport where we learnt how to properly put fires out with the different types of fire extinguishers with the right technique for the extinguisher. We then headed to the flood chamber where we had to block holes with wooden wedges as the water was flowing through cracks and holes, the water was freezing so we had to work fast.

After we all got out safely we dried off and got changed we ate our lunch on the way to Whenuapai Air Force Base, where we toured through all the trades We then got to see the Hercules and got a tour of the whole plane and we got to sit in the captains' seat and look at all the controls.

We received certificates saying we completed the Defence Careers Experience at the Devonport Naval Base and learnt basic discipline, the barracks routine, insight into Navy life and personal training. We then put our bags on the bus said our farewells to the staff who gave us the experience of our future careers in the Defence Forces and then headed home back to our life with a lot of information and an amazing experience of what I want to do for the rest of my life.

# Student Contributions

An Australian mining company have proposed to mine coal on the Denniston Plateau. This is a terrible idea because it is a very special piece of land, home to species of animals and plants found nowhere else in the world.

There are many undiscovered species living in the plateau as a full study has not yet been made of the 106 hectare piece of land. It is crucial that it is left untouched to preserve this unique piece of national heritage for future generations. Animals that live on the plateau such as the South Island Kaka, the Carnivorous Giant Land Snail, the great spotted Kiwi and the West Coast green gecko are unique to New Zealand and make their homes on the plateau. Some animals and plants are counting on us to rescue their habitat on the remarkable Denniston Plateau.

Mining the Denniston Plateau would affect the environment greatly and destroy the amazing piece of land that many animals call home.

It has been suggested that genetically modified foods should not be available on our supermarket shelves. There is a vast amount of conflicting information regarding genetically modified food from very well respected researchers and research institutes. On one side of the argument it has been suggested that genetically modified food is the only way that we will be able to feed the projected future human population. On the other side, research is showing us that we do not understand the full impact that the genetically modified plants' cellular structure will have on our digestive system, our health and equally if not more important, the environment.

In G.M. wheat there is a new protein called gliadin. It is not gluten. Everybody is susceptible to the gliadin protein which is an opiate that contains narcotic qualities. This attaches to receptors in the brain that stimulates appetite so much so that consumption rate has increased by 440 calories per day, thus making obesity an impending problem. Ingestion of Olecules, also found in genetically modified wheat, can have profound effect on human genes that is not nullified by cooking or digestion and remains in the future generations' gene pool[2].

However, with the ability to produce larger crops, genetically modified food production may be the only way we can sustain our rapidly increasing world population. The top ten identified genetically modified foods in the United States of America are sugar beets, potatoes, corn, tomatoes, squash, golden rice, soybean, oils, animal feed and salmon. In the United States genetic modification of foods has increased into almost every food group.

The labelling system of G.M. food needs to dramatically improve to allow consumers to make an informed choice about what they purchase. Clear labelling should be provided in supermarkets and food retailers that displays critical information to customers about any genetically modified product or process within that food. This labelling needs to be internationally standardised.

In conclusion, it is blatantly clear that inclusion of genetically modified foods is inevitable but consumers should have the right to know what is in their food. Therefore appropriate and standardised labelling is essential so that consumers can make an informed choice.

## Talent Quest

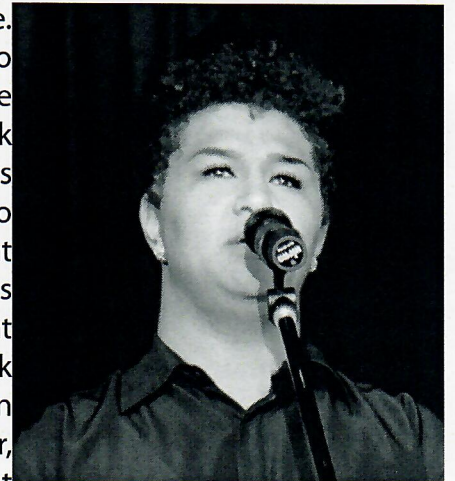
This year's talent quest hosted 20 fantastic, talented acts showcasing the amazing talent our students have here at Te Puke. This one night performance proved yet again that the students of

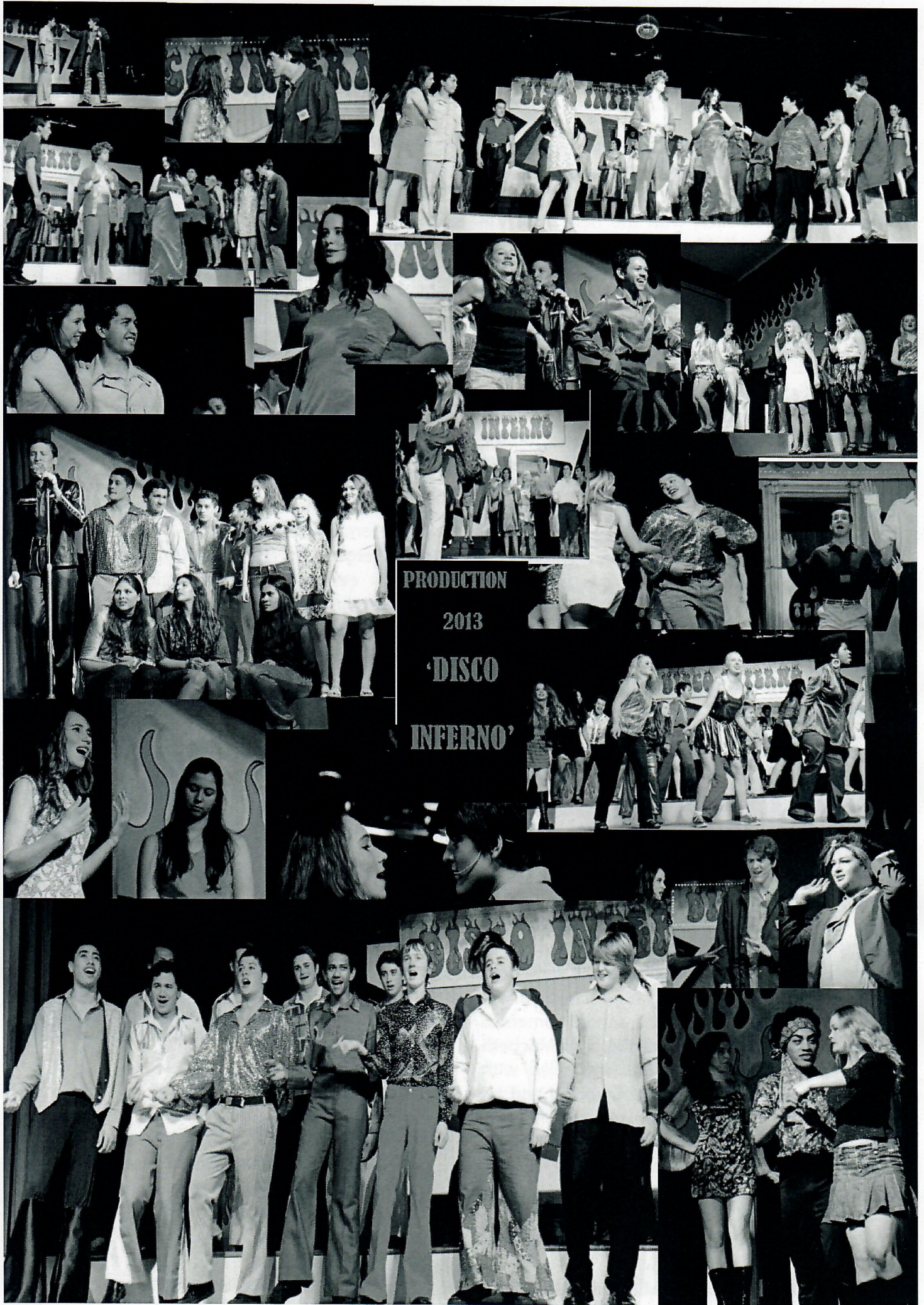

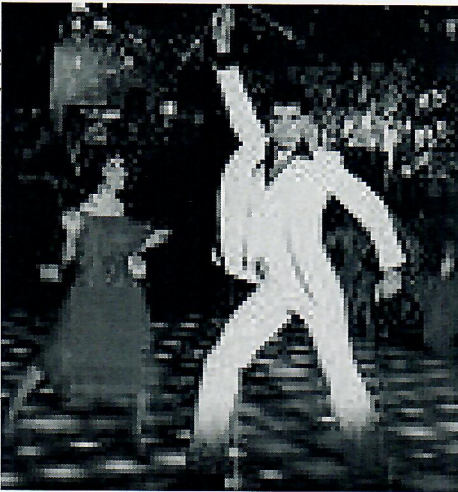

## Disco Inferno

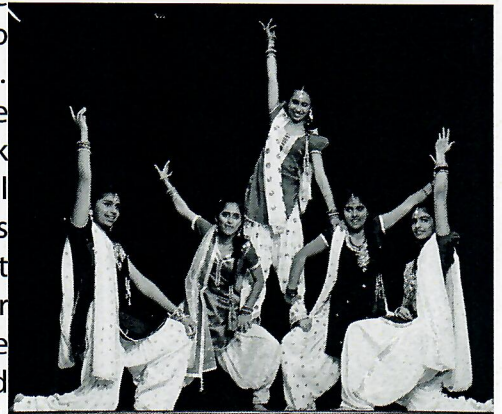
Te Puke High School put on a groovy production of the hit 70s musical DISCO INFERNO in Term two this year. Directed by the fantastic Mr Smith



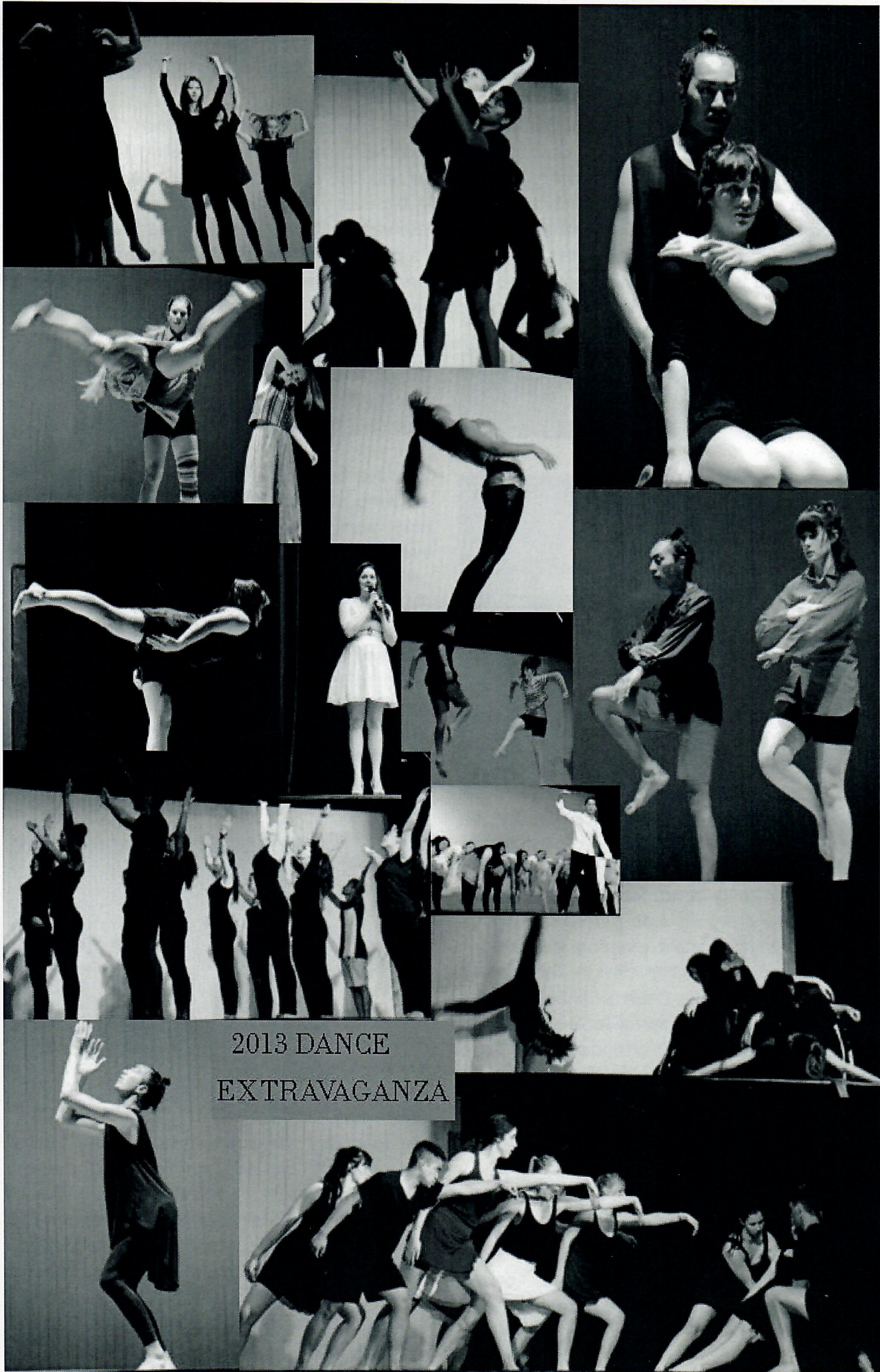

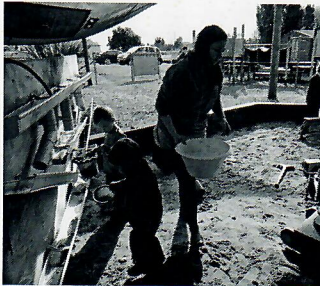

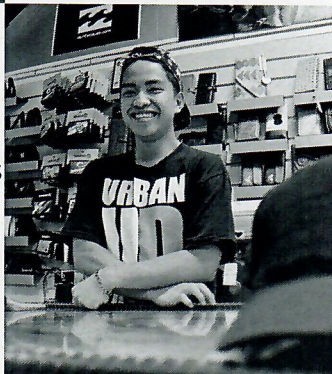

for a life time. On the first day the lunch was horrible, potato and leek soup. I remember this because it was so bad.

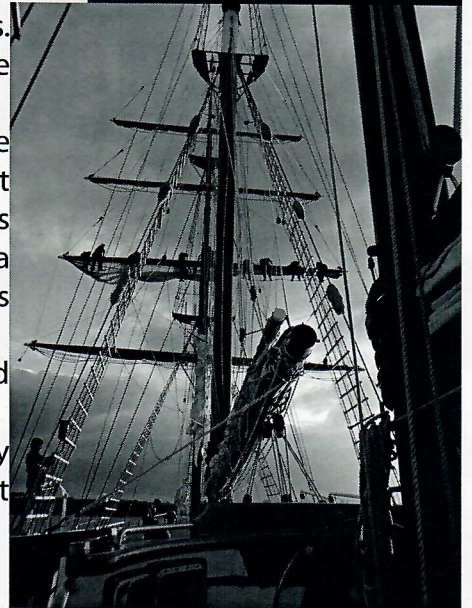
After a few days we left the confined space of Auckland harbour we headed out to the wide open spaces of the open sea. The way out was awesome, big wave's people jumping around being silly.

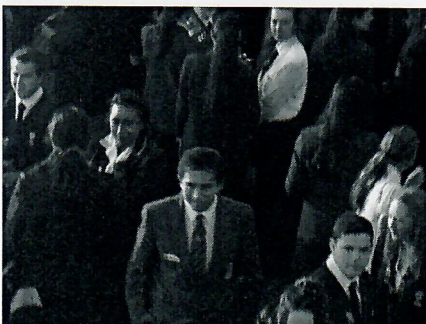

On the last day it was so sad to leave all my new friends behind and not get to see them again for a very long time.

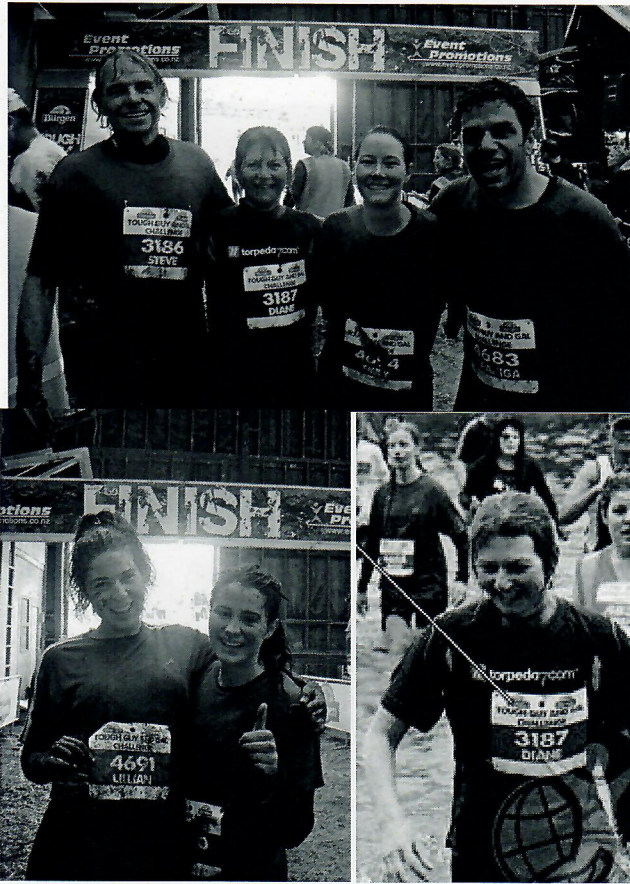
This trip was so amazing and was really good for building my confidence in speaking in front of strange people. I don't regret going on it like I thought I was going to.

# Mentoring

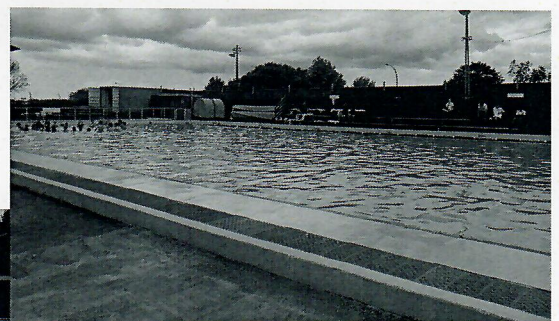

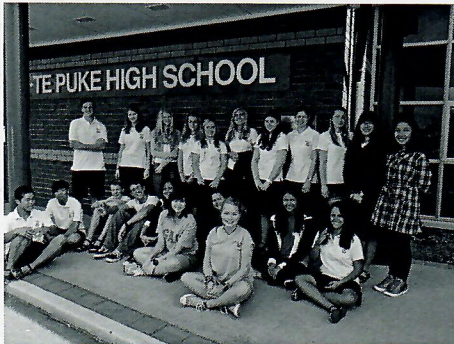

The students become involved in all aspects of school life including sporting, cultural, performing arts, music, etc and have attended the

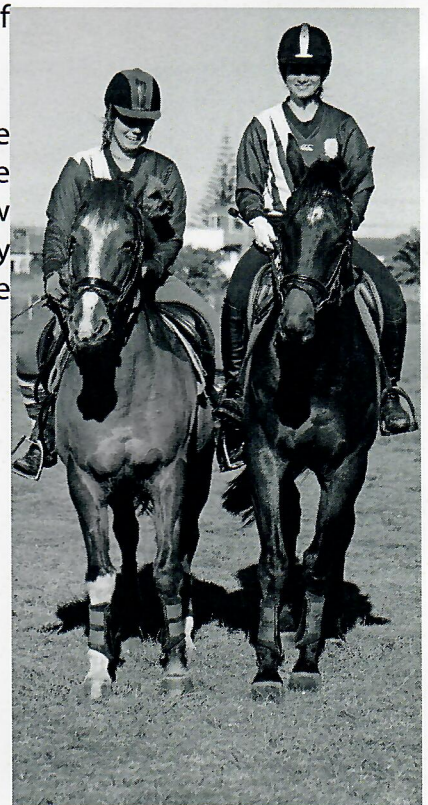

# Ag/Hort

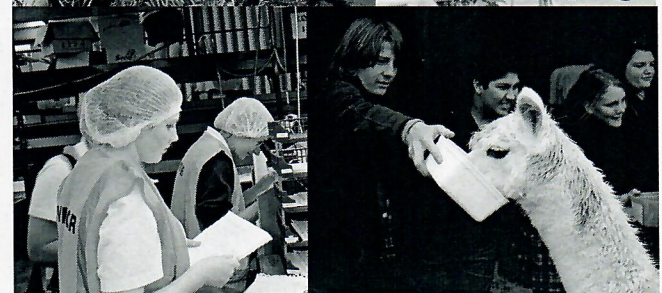

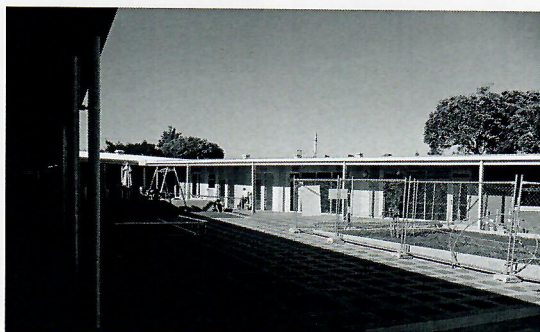
No. It wasn't happening.

# Food Technology

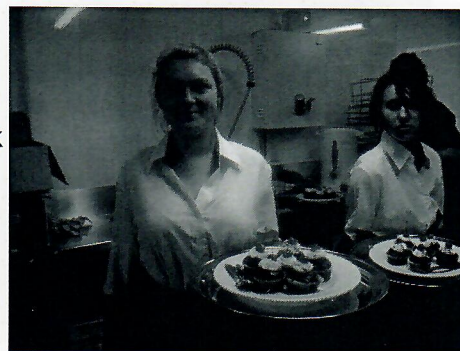

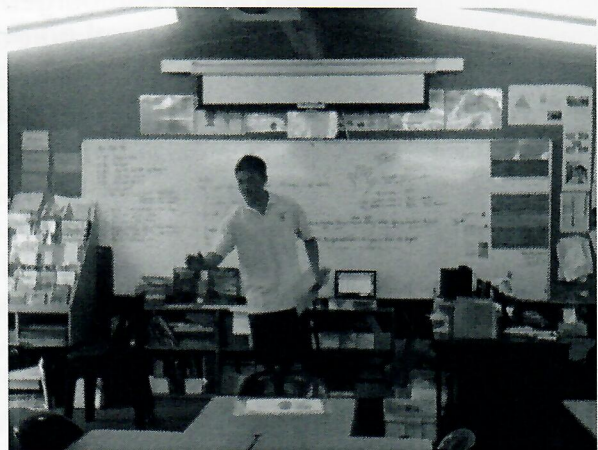

# Mathematics

2013 has been a challenging year, but a good one with many changes. The challenge has come from the transition from the standard classroom setup with one teacher and 30+ students in fixed seating to a "pod" arrangement where two or more classes are seated at the same time potentially doing different subjects. In this early stage of development this is quite an extraordinary procedure which takes some getting used to. The teacher, with their resources, does a lot of the moving as well as the students. The process is meant to evolve into an integrated learning environment as time progresses where there will be subject overlap, cross-curricular activities, themes, elements of vocational direction and team teaching all going on at the same time. In fact the possible outcome is intriguing as well as potentially brilliant, but there is a reasonably long 'teething' period of incubation before the model is fully developed and the pattern that best supports the learning of students at TPHS is fully realized.

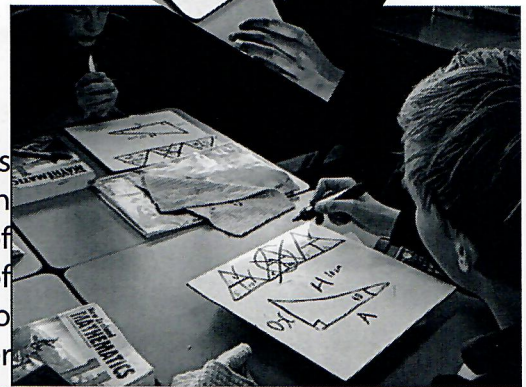
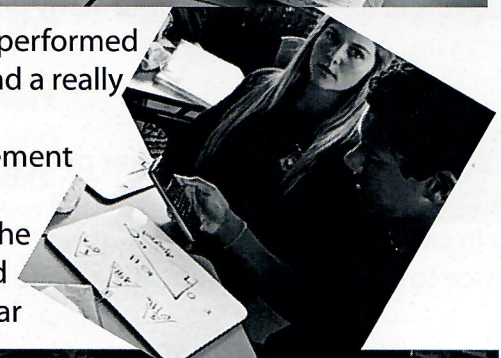
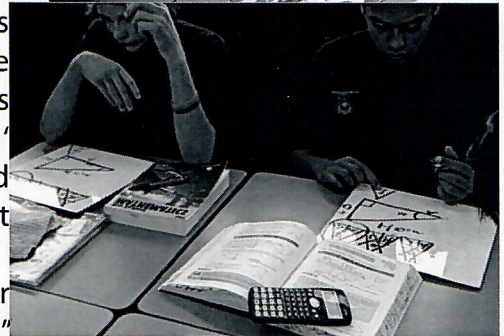
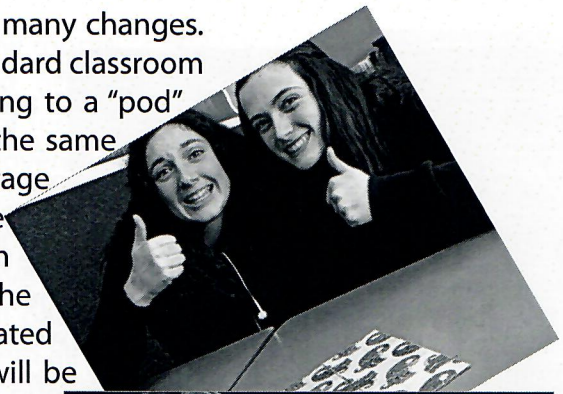
This year the Mathematics department sent two teams of Year 9 and two teams of Year 10 students to the annual "Mathsmind" competition held at Edgecumbe College. Both teams performed admirably and scored highly in both competitions and they had a really fun filled day with complementary gift packages for all.

2013 has been the first year for NCEA Level 3 (Year 13) Achievement Standards as well. A lot of work has gone into developing the standard for our use and in preparing courses which best fits the needs of our pupils. This brings to an end a cycle which started in 2012 with developing Achievement standard courses for Year 11, then in 2012 for Year 12 and this year for Year 13. We will still need to re-structure what we have learned from these experiences to make the system operate as best we can but the framework has finally been established.

So 2014 promises to be the year of the "pods" and a focus in particular on our Year 9's and 10's and how we can accommodate better learning systems for them. Part of the process of being a teacher is the continual over-haul of education and the educational process. There is no time to relax and settle down as new initiatives are coming at a greater rate than ever before and education is re-inventing itself. The world is changing and the time has come to recognize these changes and actually try to do something about them. How this all pans out in the end is a real mystery, however it is being thought through right now and is being enacted as I write.

Finally, we have had a really successful year and made excellent progress with most students during this time and will shortly say farewell to our Year 13 students who have finally worked through 5 years of study and graduated. We especially congratulate them on a job well done and wish all our departing students all the very best for their future adventures.

# Te Ringa Awhina

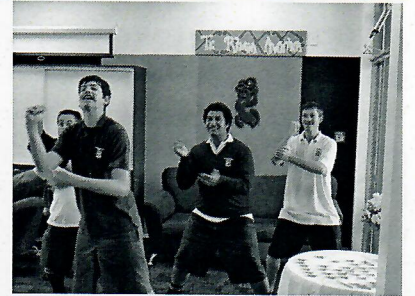

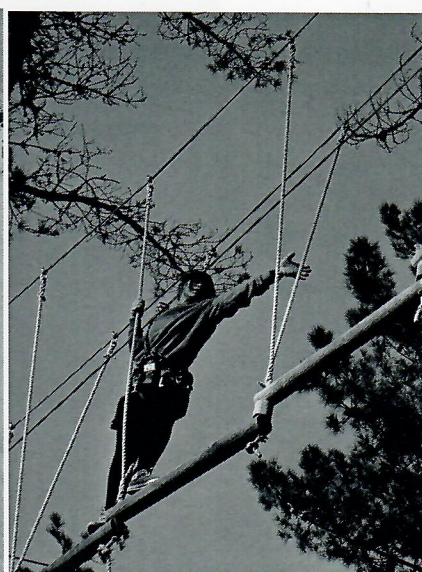
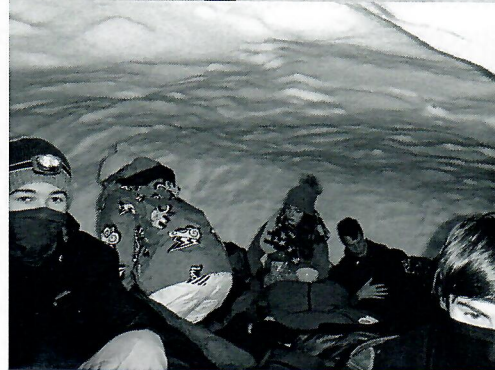
The Manak room was "Manarific" we filmed the class "free running" into the foam pit. Our oed class was never shy to be the highlight of the film. (check us out on UTube)

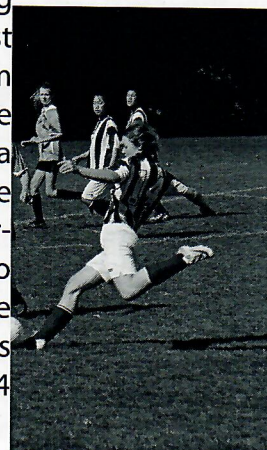
## Boys First XI Football

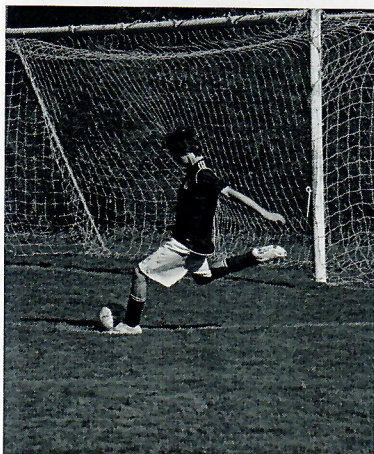


## Junior A Football

## Badminton

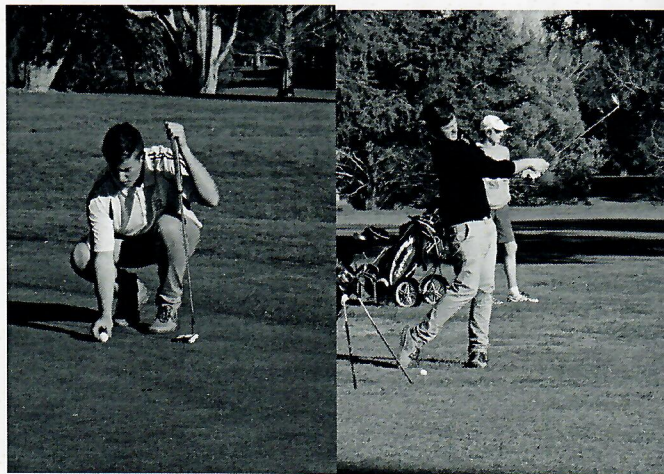

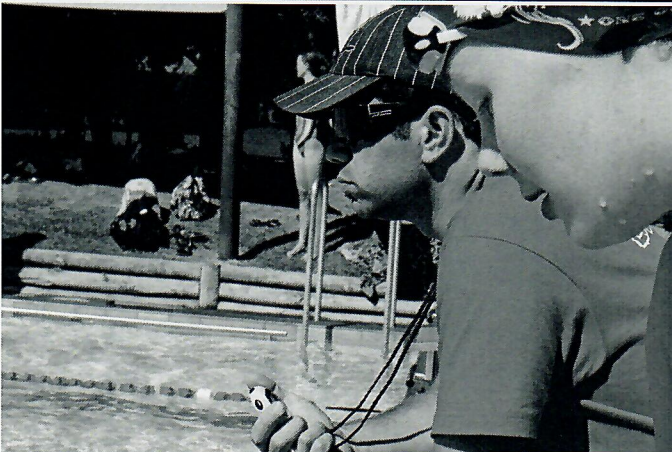
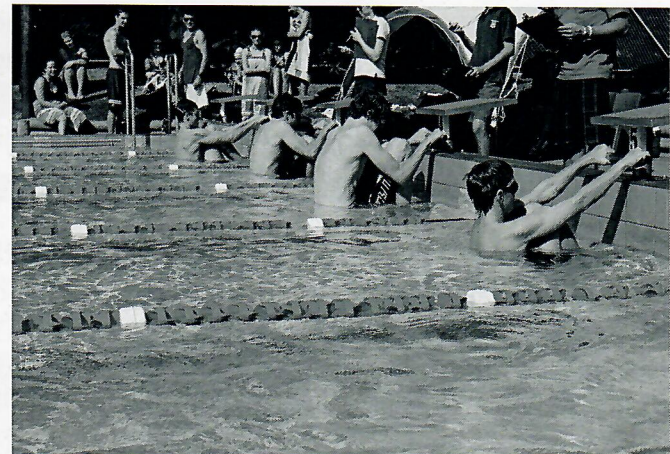
# Girls Rugby

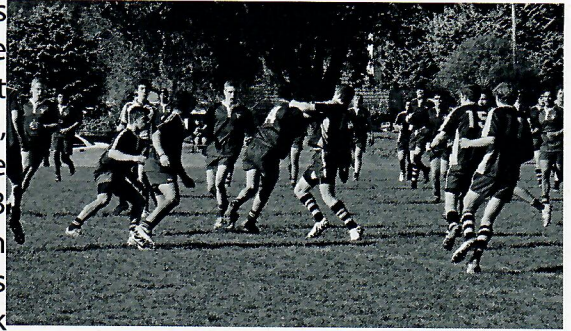

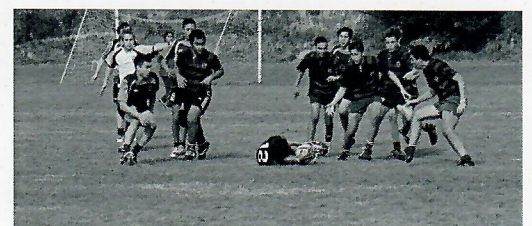

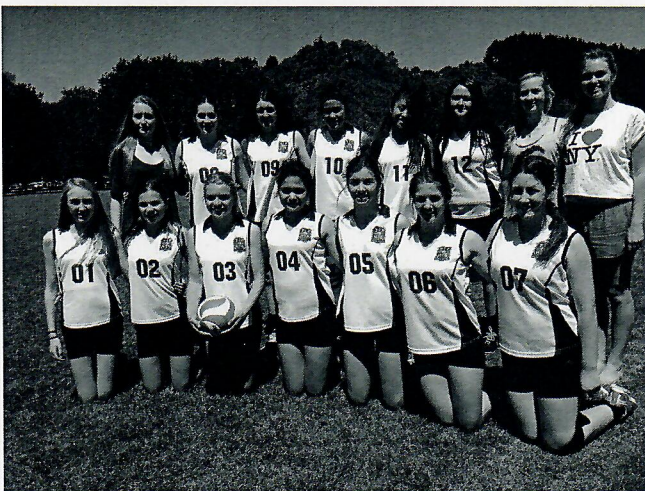
# Second XV Rugby
